

Morell Is Held As Example Of Enterprising Community

Under an amendment to the Town Planning Act given second reading in the Legislature yesterday every school district in the Province is empowered to set up a new group to be known as the Community Improvement Committee.

Composed of five members elected at an annual or special meeting of the district ratepayers, the Committee is given authority to enter into agreement on behalf of the residents of the district with any municipality, incorporated village, company or other person for either one or all of the following purposes: fire protection, electric power, and the provision of water and sewerage facilities.

GENERAL POWERS

In addition the Act empowers the Committee to represent the community in any of the following matters:

- the location of parks and playgrounds in built-up areas, the supervision and care of parks, and the supervision of sites for roadside picnic tables;
- the neatness and beautification of school districts, the replacement of trees along roads and highways, and the prevention of garbage dumping;
- the removal of dilapidated buildings;
- the application of building regulations in built-up areas.

Communities and other groups were to be prone to run to the government for assistance with every project, Leo Rossiter (L-2nd. Kings) asserted.

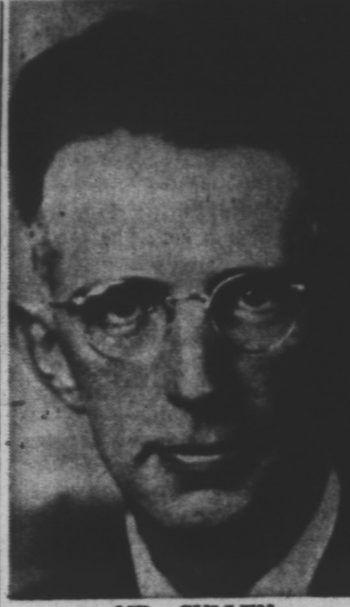
He said that other villages in the Province might do worse than take example from the village of Morell, which had won first prize in last year's rural beautification contest with no assistance other than that provided by the community itself.

Clerk Of House Commended For Doing 'Excellent Job'

Speaking on the report of the House Select Standing Committee on Revising the Journals tabled in the Legislature yesterday, chairman Harvey Douglas (L-2nd. Kings) congratulated Thomas Cullen of Midgell, on the excellent job he was doing in keeping the Journals.

A former Speaker of the House, and Liberal representative for Second Kings, Mr. Cullen has been Clerk to the Island Assembly for several sessions. Mr. Douglas suggested that the volumes should have the index at the front for greater convenience. The speeches made by the members of the House in both the draft and budget debates should be transcribed, bound and placed in the Legislative Library, he said.

RECORDING BETTER

Dr. Dewar (PC-2nd Prince) another committee member, said that the recording was much better this year, the voices of the various members being easily recognized.

The transcriptions from the machine were also excellent, the Prime member said.

According to the Island history compiled by Dr. Frank MacKinnon, legislative records were much more complete 100 years ago than they were today. Dr. Dewar endorsed Mr. Douglas's suggestion that the main speeches made in the House this session be transcribed and preserved for future reference.

The third member of this standing committee, Mofley M. Bell, QC (L-5th. Prince), said the speeches transcribed thus far

were better than these actually given.

JOB FOR EXPERT

It illustrated how a well-trained transcriber could insert necessary grammatical correction as the transcription was being done.

Premier Matheson congratulated both the machine operator and the lady transcribing the records. Their work was considerably in contrast to that done two years ago, he said. It justified the retention of the equipment.

He suggested that all manuscripts be edited by those concerned before final transcription. The committee agreed.

should be used to upset legislation that we have handed down to our incorporated towns or the City of Charlottetown," said Mr. Bell.

He traced the history of law making showing that the Greeks and Romans had handed down their laws to the British who in turn had handed them to the federal government of Canada. The provinces were granted legislation by the federal government and they saw fit to grant legislation to the incorporated municipalities.

TOUGH PUNISHMENT

He recalled that according to Greek history, the legislature was plagued by the number of people who wanted to introduce amendments to the laws. Quite often these people by their powers of persuasion were able to have the amendment passed.

"Finally," said Mr. Bell, "the legislature was obliged to take stern measures. They required the person seeking the amendment to stand on a box with a noose around his neck. If the amendment passed, the noose was taken off. If it didn't, the box was removed."

Mr. Bell said the cities and towns have a right to regulate for taxation in regard to taxi drivers, insurance companies, banks, etc. "If not, we could be flooded with people paying no share of the town's tax burden, to the detriment of the regular residents of the place."

He felt the bill should have been sponsored on a higher level in view of its widespread implications effecting as it does the whole province.

A PERFECT RIGHT

Premier Matheson said any private member had a perfect right to introduce a bill so long as it does not involve the spending of public money.

Mr. Saville thought if the act went through it would cause a lot of confusion.

C. C. Baker moved that the Speaker take the chair but later withdrew his motion.

Hon. Eugene Cullen said he agreed that the bill may not be entirely correct in its wording but he felt there was a definite need to take action on this matter of paying more than one tax. He said it could happen that under the present provisions of the law, an ordinary tradesman might pay up to \$25 or \$30 a year and if all the incorporated villages and the six incorporated towns were to exercise their prerogative a person might pay as high as \$600 in one year.

SHOULD HAVE CEILING

Mr. Cullen felt the time had come when a ceiling must be put on the amount of individual tax required to pay. He did not agree with Morley Bell that the Legislature had no right to interfere. "If we feel that an act should be rescinded or repealed, then it is our duty to do so forthwith. We are responsible for the act, not only in the year it is passed but for those that have been passed 50 years ago."

Mr. Cullen said an injustice was being done in more cases than in Charlottetown. He took Souris for instance. He said many people are being taxed for working at an industry established by the government.

He said the paved streets of Souris and the road leading to the wharf had been built by the Island Government and yet farmers are charged taxes when they go down to the wharf to load their own potatoes.

Village Poll Tax Act Given Second Reading

Residents of all incorporated villages in the Province between the ages of 21 and 65 inclusively, who are property owners, and those who are not property owners but gainfully employed may be assessed a village poll tax not exceeding five dollars annually, under provision of an Act to Amend the Village Services Act (1954), given second reading in the local Legislature yesterday.

The new enactment also provides that a frontage tax and service charge may be imposed and collected in villages where a sewerage and/or water system has been constructed.

PROPERTY NEEDED

The Act also provides that a Village Commissioner unless he or she is the owner of real property and provides that the office of a Commissioner shall be declared vacant when said Commissioner has missed three consecutive meetings of the Commission without just cause.

Frank Myers (PC-1st. Queens) said he did not agree with barring non-property owners from being elected as a village Commissioner. Many of these best qualified to fill such a position such as bank managers, lived in rented quarters. Dr. Dewar (PC-2nd. Prince) agreed.

Harvey Douglas (L-2nd. Kings) disagreed. He said that since it was the property owners who had to foot the bill for any major project, it was only right that they alone should be eligible for the office of Commissioner.

The argument did not make much difference since under the Act as written even 50 cents worth of real property was sufficient to qualify a resident for

might be living in the same village but in different school districts.

Hon. Keir Clark said the bill conflicts with several other acts, such as the School Act and the Town Act and it should be looked into more carefully.

Mr. Clark said that in Montague and Souris there was a school tax and a poll tax. He said the school operates apart from the town and the act could result in the elimination of either of these taxes.

The Education Minister felt that man paying tax in one place should get a credit on his tax at the next place he might be working in. However he thought the whole act was a bit too involved to be introduced at the present time.

Brenton St. John said the suggestion that a map be required to pay only one tax, that is either school tax or town tax was ridiculous. Speaking for Souris, he said it would be necessary to close down either the town or the school.

"What's sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander," said Hon. Douglas MacKinnon who noted that Parkdale residents on top of a heavy village tax and school tax were required to pay another \$25 when they came to Charlottetown. He noted that Charlottetown workers were not required to pay when they performed their duties in Parkdale.

Mr. Acorn: "What's to stop Parkdale from putting on a tax?"

HEARD CRITICISM

Morely M. Bell said he had heard criticism of the House to the effect that anyone who wanted to bring a bill into the Legislature, so long as he got enough support for it, could have it passed.

He said any bill coming up should be given 24 hours notice, especially when it was of a contentious nature such as the one before the House. He said there were other occasions when amendments farther reaching than the bill itself were introduced on short notice. He did not think that these things should be done.
