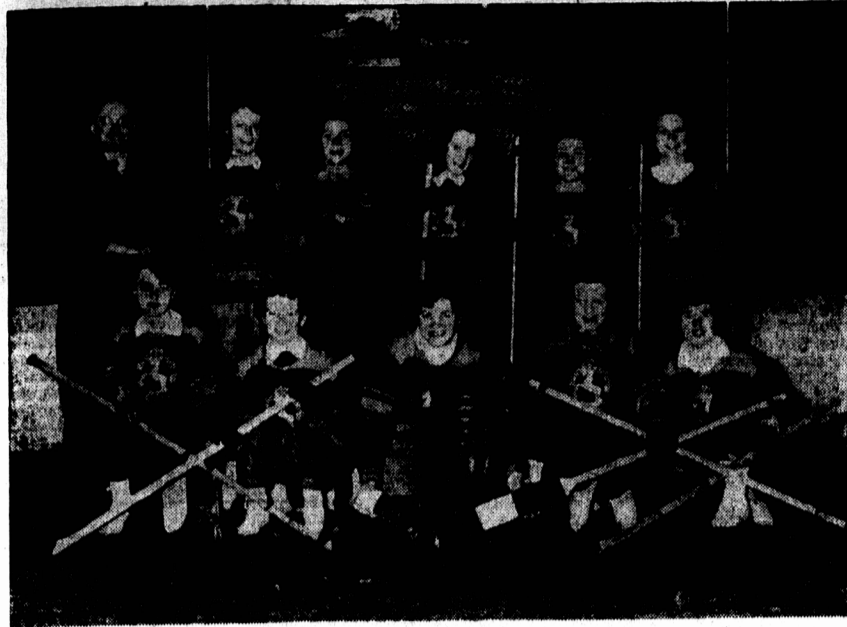


W. K. S. Girls Championship Team

o'clock and Professor Hamilton lost no time in judging the cattle. The 43 head were entered in four classes with 14 head in the 700-800 lb. class; 12 head in the 801-900 lb. class; eight head in the 901-1000 lb. class; and nine in the class for animals over 1,000 lbs. A steer owned by Luke Praught of Earnsccliffe won top honors in the 700-800 lb. class. Carlyle Potts reserve grand champion won the 800-900 lbs. class honors while Fulton Sanderson's champion topped the 900-1000 lb. class. Lyle Boswall of Marshfield owned the steer that won the heavy class.

The winning of the reserve grand championship was a signal honor for Mr. Potts as it was the first time he had ever entered an animal in a show of this kind. The steer, a Shorthorn, is the only purebred animal in his herd. He was sired by Marquis Wool and his mother is Dykeman Miss Ramsden.

The animals in each class were classified according to groups and then placed by the judge. There were three groupings in each class with the winner of Group 1 being the best animal in the class. This morning the sale that is being held in connection with the show will commence at ten o'clock. About 40 head of breeding stock will be sold along with the fat stock.

Prizes Presented

Prizes were donated to the winners yesterday and these were presented by Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture. Fulton Sanderson received a pair of book ends from Simpson's for winning the grand championship. Two show halters donated by the P.E.I. Hereford Breeders Association went to the other winners: Luke Praught, Carlyle Potts and Lyle Boswall.

The owners of the grand champion and reserve each won ten dollars, donated by Mr. Wellington MacNeill. Chairman of the executive in charge of the show is Dr. J. P. Lantz, President of the Exhibition Association. Mr. H. J. Kennedy and other exhibition officials have performed most of the work leading up to the staging of the show.

N.H.L. Attendance Shows Decline

NEW YORK, March 27—(AP)—Attendance in the National Hockey League's regular season declined some 30,000 in comparison with 1950-51.

Unofficial figures compiled today showed the six clubs drew 2,310,316 fans during the regular campaign which ended last night, against 2,362,892 last season. New York Rangers showed the biggest increase, jumping from 349,251 to 376,645.

Internal Feud in C.C.L. Grows Hotter

OTTAWA, March 27—(CP)—The Canadian Congress of Labor's internal feud became hotter today as James E. McGuire, central figure in an intra-union scrap was pushed out of the C. C. L.'s executive. He then charged "dictatorial

Additional entertainment for the enthusiastic fans, was a sudden-death League Game between the Crapaud "Hertbreaker Sisters" and the Cape Traverse "Rover Sisters." The "Rover Sisters" won and will now advance into the finals for the Physical Fitness Trophy. Those who won first prizes in the Races are eligible to compete in the Island Interscholastic Meet.
