We understand that at a meeting of the Fire Department yesterday it was decided to allow the Water Commissioners to take one of the steam fire engines out to Three Mile Run for the purpose of testing the water supply there. As the vote granting permission was very close, it is not yet known whether the offer will be accepted or not.

Mr. W. A. McNEIL, of Georgetown, who, for two years past has been secretary of the Charlottetown Business College, is in the city en route for New York to push his fortune. Fortunately before they had been in the water very long they were rescued by two sailors who were in a boat and had witnessed the accident.

Our telegraphic despatches a day or two ago, announced that a sad accident had happened a man named Gaston at the Truro Railway station, and that his life was despaired of. To-day we have to announce his death. It appears that Gaston was seeing his brother off for British Columbia, and in stepping off the train was shoved by the crowd against the car, and slipped from the platform under an immigrant car. Agent Donkin was the first to detect the poor fellow's danger and caught him by the collar of his coat. The wheels of the car struck his foot. Donkin says he felt the man tremble as if an electric shock had gone through him, and it required considerable strength to hold him as the journal ground his leg off. The station was crowded and the sad affair was sickening, his friends being perfectly powerless to help him.

BETWEEN ten and eleven o'clock last night the police visited the store of a Queen Street man, for whom their search for violators of the Scott Act, and who they suspected was inside. They were refused admission, and proceeded to break in the door. When they had broken through the outside door, and were doing their best to perform the same operation upon the inside one, the door was opened and they walked in. They proceeded to search the house, but could not find the party they wanted, who, it is said, had escaped through a skylight while the police were endeavoring to force the doors in. The police also visited and searched a house on Lower St. Peter's Road, in which the party wanted is alleged to reside, but could not find him. The operations on the house on Queen Street were witnessed by a large number of people. We understand that all interested in the business are to be present.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.)

Boddler McGarrigle Again.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.

Secretary Bayard has transmitted to the President, the official report of the application of the State of Illinois for the extradition of McGarrigle, the fugitive boddler now in Canada. The Secretary takes the position that there is absolutely no ground upon which the United States can interfere. The conspiracy for McGarrigle's rescue was planned and executed in the United States. No request for the surrender of McGarrigle can be made by the United States to the British Government on the grounds of comity, as it is not the practice of the Government in any case to ask for the surrender of a fugitive on this ground, because it is almost uniformly held that the United States will be unable to comply with a reciprocal request.

No Disquieting Influences.

PARIS, Sept. 15.

The Temps, commenting upon the Count of Paris' manifesto, says: "The document will have no disquieting influence on the country, and will only excite and embarrass the Right, owing to their approachment with the Government. It indicates between the Count's views and the Cesarist doctrine of empire, that a monarchy can only be restored through a violent international crisis and triumph of anarchy. Republicans, whose political experience continues to increase, will not afford the monarchy that chance. The Unionists says the manifesto amounts to a renunciation of the traditional monarchy, and that in that count is become the imulator and imitator of Napoleon.

An Important Manifesto.

PARIS, Sept. 15.

One of the most important manifestoes that ever appeared in Europe was posted during last night, in the principal towns throughout France. The Comte de Paris had sent his instructions to all the royalist committees throughout the country. At midnight at each of the capital towns of each of the eighty-six departments of France a royalist agent handed or mailed an envelope containing the complete platform of the Royalists, as understood by the Comte de Paris to the chief of the revolutionist committees.

The Landlords' Conference.

DUBLIN, Sept. 15.

At a conference of Irish landlords to-day, resolutions were adopted by a unanimous vote denying that the present rents prevailing in Ireland were excessive, or that generous and reasonable abatements have been refused in times of distress. Rents had not been raised in Ireland between 1840 and 1880, while in England, Scotland and Wales rents for the same time were increased 34 and 49 per cent.

A Premature Report.

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.

The rumor from Washington that Sir John McDonald had already been appointed Fishery Commissioner for Canada is premature, although his colleagues are pressing him to accept the position, and it is generally believed that he will accede to their wishes.

An Election Trial.

HALIFAX, Sept. 15.

The trial of the Victoria election case began to-day. The only one witness examined to-day was John Doucette, who swore that he received three dollars to vote for John A. Macdonald.

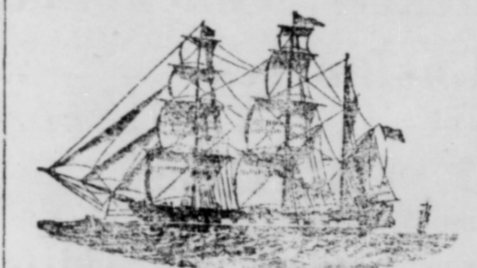
