A Drunkard's Purchase.

A middle-aged man of considerable energy, who had been the slave for a long time of the intoxicating cup, was sitting in a saloon, considerably the worse for drink. He lifted up his eyes, and seeing a picture hanging on the wall, his curiosity led him to examine into the subject of it, and finding it was "Christ's Own Redeemed," he called the liquor seller. Pointing to the picture, he asked, "What is that?" "O, it is just a picture to fill up and ornament the wall with." And the customer again pointing to the subject of it said, "When you know that you are weak the bodies of our fellowmen all these weeks round, what right have you to hang such a picture that on your wall?" The sense of this reproach was felt by the saloon-keeper, although it did come from the lips of a drunkard. Calling in a member of his family he said, "Take down that picture at once, and put it away." The customer seeing it removed, asked the owner, "Wad ye no, sell?" (Would you not sell it?) The man named a price which the customer gladly paid, and went away with his purchase rejoicing. The man has since given up the drink and come to the Lord, and it has been my privilege to see the picture hanging above the redeemed man's fireplace. —English Paper.

Degradation by Drink.

The body of Miss Susan Harrington, Hoboken, was found on the 10th of her son, and he was arrested on suspicion of having had some knowledge of how she was killed. He swore that he was in bed at the time and drunk that night, and was ignorant of how she came to die. The police were satisfied that the woman had been under the influence of drink and had fallen down stairs.

During the funeral services the priest, directing his eyes toward the son, who all this time knelt with his wife and child in close to the bier, cried out in a loud voice: "Young man! there lies your mother in a dishonored coffin through drink, and your drunkness has added to the dishonor of her memory. You are her only child, you alone are left to redeem your mother's name. Are you man enough to stand up before her body and promise God that the cursed glass shall never again defile your lips? Stand up!"

The whole congregation seemed for a moment spellbound, sobbing and crying, then loud cries from men as well as women of that right! that's right! he is a brave man! My God! my God! you've greeted him as he stood up and advanced toward the altar railing and repeated the solemn words of the pledge for life. There was not a dry eye in the whole church, and even Father Corrigan's own voice betrayed emotion, as he repeated the words for McCoy: "I promise to abstain from intoxicating drink during the remainder of my life."

The Rev. Dr. Foster says: "Three-fourths of our Church members are women. The women are already better educated as a class than the men. They are rapidly coming to the front in all great reforms, not only in temperance, but in helping the Indian, in mission work, in defence of public schools, in city charities. If the men do not mend their ways, and stop drinking liquor and staying away from church, and neglecting an education, and dragging politics in the mud, one of these days there will be an overturning as sure as right is right, and the government of nation, state, city and home will be in the hands of those best fitted to exercise it. The men of this nation would do well to take warning. They are dropping behind at a fearful rate to the advance of humanity. The chief hope for them is that woman as she rises is doing her utmost to lift man up to her platform of intelligence and piety."

Worried by Dees.—The Newcastle Advocate says: On Wednesday last a little girl of about seven years old, a child of Mr. Alfred Shaw, while proceeding on an errand for her mother, was attacked on the high road by the massed hith and two pups owned by Mr. Adams. The child was well wrapped up and had sense enough to throw herself down in the snow, at the same time screaming for help with all her might. Her father, who was at work in the yard of his residence, heard the noise, and looking over the fence, discovered that the dogs were worrying something lying in the snow and ran to the rescue, beating the dogs off and discovering that it was his own child the brutes were attacking. The child had several wounds in the scalp and one of her ears was also badly torn.

Electrical Torpedoes.

SUCCESSFUL EXPERIMENTS WITH THE NEW INVENTION AT PORTSMOUTH

LONDON Feb 18.—There was an interesting and successful test yesterday in Portsmouth harbor of the new Sims-Edison electrical torpedo. The trial took place under the direction of the admiralty officials, and representatives of most of the European powers were present. The naval attaches of France, Germany, Russia, Austria, Italy, Spain and Turkey were among those who witnessed the experiment, and the United States was represented by Messrs. Post and Emory. The torpedo was launched in St. Peter's bay from the steamer "Dudge," which was lent for the purpose by the Arm-troops, who are understood to be interested in the invention. Mr. Sims personally operated the torpedo. It was sent out a distance of 1/2 mile and a quarter, and was under such perfect control that the manipulator turned it at will in any direction while the frigate was tinkling rapidly along more than a mile away. All the witnesses expressed great admiration for the invention. There is reason to believe, however, that the admiralty will not adopt it unless compelled to, as the officials have not forgotten their experience with the Brennan torpedo, which was similar to the Sims-Edison in many respects, and for which they paid £25,000. They have spent over £100,000 in tinkering up the defects discovered in the practical working of the device, and are now obliged to admit that it is little more than a costly toy. Distinguished experts at the time the Brennan invention was on trial urged that no purchase be made until the torpedo had stood the test of long practical work, but their advice was disregarded. The best features of the Brennan and of the present invention are admittedly the creation of British army engineers, and have been developed at the cost of the taxpayers, and the government is heard in many quarters that it would be only fair all around to wait and let these engineers perfect the torpedo and get whatever credit there is to be gained thereby, while at the same time saving a good deal of money for the people. Experts admit that the Sims-Edison invention would displace the Brennan if adopted, as it is decidedly the better torpedo, but they urge that it would be better to wait until it has stood the test of actual work. It is reported that the inventors do not take kindly to a rival, and that their terms are immoderate as regards the price. It is possible the admiralty is now dilemmated as to whether to buy or to let the inventors develop it to the risk of having an invention, which is admitted superior to the one now in use, secured by some rival government.

Church and State in France.

A BILL THAT LOOKED LIKE THE ENTERING WEDGE FOR SEPARATION.

PARIS, Feb 18.—The French ministry have tendered their resignations to President Carnot. The cause of their resignation was the action of the chamber of deputies in connection with the bill dealing with associations. Hubbard demanded urgency for the bill as a reply to the attitude of the French bishops. De Cassabias described the bill as an iniquitous measure. Premier Dreyfus denied that the measure was intended as an act of prosecution of the church or that it need be regarded as the precursor of the separation of church and state. He gave his assent to the demand for urgency, though he said that he would not give the measure the significance Hubbard desired. Dreyfus demanded that the order of the day be moved, indicating the views of the churchmen on the subject. Boissier thereupon moved that the government be requested to continue its Republican policy. Dreyfus accepted the motion, and intimated that he considered it a cabinet question. Boissier's motion was rejected, 304 to 202. The ministers, recognizing their defeat, immediately left the house in a body. The Chamber then rejected the urgency motion, 286 to 246.

In order to bring about a cessation in the friction between France and the Vatican, due to the refusal of Cardinal Richard, Archbishop of Paris, to communicate to him by the Pope in which His Holiness enjoins French prelates to give adhesion to the Republic. Cardinal Ronconi, Papal Secretary of State, has notified the French Government that the papal legate at Paris is ordered to distribute copies of the Pope's letter to the Bishop.

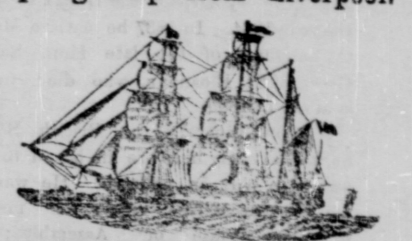
