### GRAND DIVISION S. OF T. MEET IN QUARTERLY SESSION.

The third quarterly session of the Grand Division of P. E. Island meet in quarterly session at Searletown on the 20th, inst.

The general routine of business was gone through and the following resolution passed with but one dissenting voice:

Whereas, the Government of this Province has passed a law to license the sale of intoxicating liquors in opposition to the well understood wishes of this Grand Division which has again and again declared against the principle of raising a revenue from the Liquor traffic.

Therefore, Resolved, that this Grand Division place on record its unqualified disapproval of the course pursued by the Government, and further,—

Resolved, That, we will support no candidate for the Legislative Assembly who will not pledge himself to vote for the repeal of this obnoxious measure at the earliest possible opportunity.

The public meeting was presided over by P. G. W. P., J. J. Chappell, esq., Charlottetown, and was a large one. The programme consisted of speeches, singing, recitations and readings.

The next quarterly session will be held at Springfield, Lot 67, in October.

ST. ANN'S DAY.—To-day is the feast of St. Ann, the patron saint of the Indians. The celebration by the Indians at Lennox Island takes place on Sunday next. This morning a high mass was celebrated in St. Dunstan's Cathedral. The Society of St. Ann approached the Holy Table, and a sermon appropriate to the day was preached by Rev. Dr. Monaghan. This is the first time that the feast has been specially observed in this city.

BOARD OF TRADE.—The Maritime Board of Trade meets in St. John, N. B., on August 16th. Some of the questions to be considered are: the increase of tourist traffic and the development of greater accommodations for summer visitors. The statutory conditions which are concerned in fire insurance policies. The threatened increase in marine insurance rates and discrimination against Canadian ports on the Atlantic coast in this connection. The trade between Canada and the West Indies, Municipal taxation and how best it may be arranged so as to be equitable to the communication and its requirements, the iron and steel industries of N. S., and others will also be brought up.
