CHURCH OF ENGLAND SYNOD

HALIFAX, July 5.

In the Church of England Synod yesterday the subject of King's College was brought up for discussion. Rev. F. H. Almon, who was educated at King's, made an onslaught on the institution. He maintained that the views of men turned out by King's were wrong, and believed they were those that would never be the views maintained by the mass of the people. He said that the Synod had no right to direct expenditure of money collected at the altar rail, and that as long as he was rector of the church he would never take up for King's until the Low Church party, as he called it the true church party, was represented on the staff of the College. The bishop said that he would have been sorry had the teaching of King's College been proved to be Low Church, as then it would be a party, not a church institution. He could not have thought it a matter of reproach had it been shown that High Church books were being used in the College, for how could young men going into the world expect to defend their faith if they were not acquainted with the writings of other sects and parties. He said religious matters were in a state of flux, the same as in many other matters. He advised the laity to criticise what they might see wrong in King's College, and give the governors the benefit of their different views. Balloon Collapses.

BOSTON, July 5.

G. A. Rogers, aeronaut, accompanied by an assistant and a newspaper reporter, went up in a balloon yesterday. The balloon collapsed and came down in Dorchester Bay. Rogers was drowned. The assistant and reporter were picked up. The former died, but the reporter will recover.

LONDON, July 5.

Hon. Edward Blake arrived yesterday at Mobile. He appeared in excellent health and spirits, but is very reticent. He was received cordially by a number of Roman Catholic priests and prominent Home rulers, and was escorted to the hotel.

The act respecting voters' lists, 1891, was read a third time. The House was engaged most of the afternoon and evening considering railway subsidies.

Wrecked.

HALIFAX, July 5.

The ship Stewart was wrecked near Yarmouth on Sunday night. Fourteen lives were lost, including the captain's wife and child.

NORTH SYDNEY, July 5.

The Spanish steamer Salanderino, dead laden, from St. John, ran into the barque Juno in the harbor, cutting her down.

Hanlan Defeats Hosmer.

Hanlan defeated Hosmer by half a length in a three mile race yesterday. Time, 18 minutes 55 seconds.
