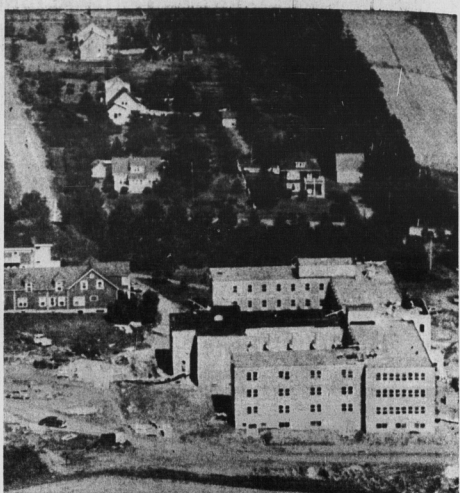

Seed Potato Outlook Good

An increase in seed potato exports was held a possibility here yesterday by Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae at the same time the Minister said indications were that the potato yield may not be as large as last year despite increased acreage.

"There is a large amount of foliage on the plants," he said, "but not a great number of tubers."

Mr. MacRae said that agricultural representatives from three countries, Jamaica, Argentina and Venezuela, who visited the province recently were "favorably impressed with our potato industry, particularly with the disease-free crop and the efforts the department is making to control disease."

Liquefied Natural Gas Plant May Serve Northern Centres

VANCOUVER (CP)—A local company with funds being funneled into the local pipeline utility system.

HAS LETTERS OF INTENT Cryogenic holds a letter of intent from Whitehorse for a distribution system and has written out franchise forms for it. It also holds letters of intent for its gas supply and transportation from well-head to the liquefaction plant. A four-inch pipeline running from the wells will be used to serve the plant.

The name Cryogenic means refrigeration or reduction to liquid.

It calls for a liquefaction plant to reduce methane gas to a liquid by lowering its temperature. The liquid methane then is transported by tank truck or tank railway car to the distribution area where it is stored, re-gasified using heat, and then

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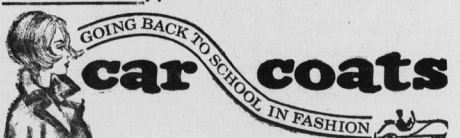
Home Near St. Peters Badly Gutted By Fire
