MR. R. HARRIS, R. C. A., and wife were passengers in the Nova Scotian from Great Britain, which arrived at Halifax on Friday last. They arrived here on Saturday evening.

THE "Myrtle Navy plug" correctly represents the whole plan upon which its manufacture is conducted. There is not a fractional part of a cent expended upon it for mere appearance. It is neither wrapped in tin foil nor worked into fancy shapes, nor put in any fancy cases, nor subjected to any kind of expense merely to please the eye or captivate the fancy. The manufacturers rightly believed that tobacco was not purchased for ornament, but for smoking and therefore all extraneous expense was avoided and added to the quality of the tobacco. The public have testified in its case that they prefer paying their money for a high quality of article than for ornament out of place.

A LONG and USEFUL LIFE.—We had the pleasure of a visit yesterday from Rev. I. E. Bill, D. D., who for many years was editor and proprietor of the Christian Visitor, St. John, and is now pastor of the Baptist Church at St. Martin's. Although Dr. Bill was 80 years of age in February last, he is remarkably vigorous in mind and body, as was evident in his address at the Convention. Since his entry into the ministry, 58 years ago, he has been an active and successful worker, with both tongue and pen; and as he still preaches twice every Sunday and sometimes oftener, we may hope he will yet see 90 years of usefulness. His "History of the Baptists of the Maritime Provinces" is a valuable contribution to the literature of the denomination. Dr. Bill is one of those who place a high value on music in public worship. His ideal is a trained congregation led by a trained choir, with the best organ obtainable, and an orchestra in addition, if available.—Anherst Gazette.

The Caroline Affair.

BARCELONA, Aug. 31. A public meeting was held here on Saturday, to protest against the seizure of the Caroline Islands by Germany. The populace demanded that the Spanish flag should be hoisted on the Government buildings, but the authorities refused. The populace became enraged, and set fire to the building. The militia were called out to quell the disturbance.

A Fearful Gale.

LONDON, Aug. 31. A fearful gale is raging on the British Islands and around the Scotch coast. The gale occasioned a fearful accident at Dawlish, on the Down coast, near Exmouth, blowing down a large portion of rock from a cliff, and burying a number of people. The bodies of a lady and baby were taken out dead. Others are still under the rocks.

A Peaceful Settlement.

LONDON, Aug. 31. It is almost certain that peace between England and Russia on the Afghan question is now completed. The two Governments are briskly engaged in arranging the last details of the mutual understanding, and negotiations are proceeding rapidly and harmoniously.

Pugilistic.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 31. In the Sullivan and McCaffrey fight, the referee decided in favor of Sullivan. The Boston slugger had all he wanted to handle McCaffrey, and he challenged Sullivan at the close to finish the fight with or without gloves.

The Greek Church.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 31. The Russian Government has issued a decree making the Greek Church the established religion of the Baltic provinces.

Smallpox in Montreal.

MONTREAL, Aug. 31. There were two hundred and sixteen deaths from smallpox in Montreal last week, and thirty new cases were reported yesterday.

Furniture Factory Burned.

NEW YORK, Aug. 31. The furniture factory of Gardun, Holmes & Co., was burned yesterday. During the fire a number of firemen were killed.

Cholera in Spain.

MADRID, Aug. 31. Returns from the cholera infected districts in Spain on Saturday show 3,617 new cases and 1171 deaths.

Cholera in Japan.

LONDON, Aug. 31. A despatch has been received here stating that cholera has appeared at Nagasaki, Japan.

The Canadian Pacific Loan.

(Montreal Gazette.)

Yesterday the transaction between the Government and the Canadian Pacific Railway company involving the cancellation of the loan of five million dollars of Treasury bills, was completed. The accounts between the country and the company now stands thus: Against the loan of thirty million dollars made by the Government in 1884 there is held twenty millions of bonds and about twenty million acres of land; the company may redeem its bonds at any time and will probably do so within a comparatively brief period, cancelling thereby two-thirds of their debt, the remainder of which will be liquidated out of the proceeds of the land sales. The validity of the security is no longer questioned, now that the British investing public has expressed confidence in the earning capacity of the railway by absorbing within a single day the whole of the recent issue of fifteen millions of bonds.

The steel works, the glass works, the Forge Company and Drake's mill, at Trenton, New Glasgow, N. S., give employment to at least three hundred hands. There has been built there during the past two or three years, a village of over one hundred houses. The works give a large amount of employment to the I. C. R. It was stated at a meeting in New Glasgow last week that the Glass Company employ about one thousand men and out-put one car load of manufactured goods per day, and use one thousand tons of coal per month, besides raw material, part delivered at Pictou Landing and carried by rail to the works, and part from Inland.—Eastern Chronicle.

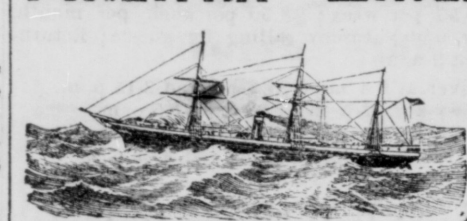
