Resolved, That this Board, having the highest opinion of the scholastic abilities and high integrity of the said Member, deem it just to him, to themselves, and to the Colony, to appoint their highest disapprobation, and to express their regard to the tone and substance of the letter in question, and considering that its effect may be very injurious unless contradicted, Resolved further, that the Secretary do communicate to the said Alex. McRae, this Resolution, and request his attention before this Board, when duly summoned to appear, to account for the contents of the said letter, and that this Resolution be published in the said SUMMERSIDE JOURNAL.

BEAR HUNTING.—The people of Surin have an interesting time of it just now bear hunting. A Mr. Edward Lyons was driving home one evening a few evenings ago, when he missed one of them. On going in search of the missing animal, he discovered it in the corner of a field, which it had been driven by a large bear. Bruin was evidently hungry, and was attacking the cow with great fury, with the object no doubt, of making a feast upon the poor creature. Mr. Lyons returned home immediately, and told her husband what she had done; but he would not believe that a bear would venture so near a dwelling, and insisted that she had been deceived. Mrs. Lyons persisted, however, and he went and went to procure the assistance of some of her nearest neighbors to rescue the cow. The men were all away from home, so that at last her husband (still doubting) and herself started, in the glow of evening to the spot where the bear and cow were seen. On coming near the locality, Lyons lighted a birch bark, and his wife aimed herself with a stout stick. In a few moments the lighted birch revealed the bear and his victim, and Mrs. Lyons became scared at the light and retreated, whilst Mr. Lyons drove the cow home. The poor beast was loudly lacerated, and is not expected to live. Since then, the whole settlement has been up in arms, but the present time Bruin has ended their vigilance and escaped their wrath.—Com.

The Ottawa Citizen says:—"The Quebec Legislature has closed its second Session, leaving its main business done upon the institutions of the Province. Whilst some foolish and narrow-minded sectional and national jealousies do occasionally crop out, it is in the main done good work. The Education Bill alone would be sufficient to mark the Session as deserving of praise, providing as it does for the settlement, on just and liberal principles, of a vexed question which might, but for the enlightenment of the Legislature, have led to dissension, bitterness and difficulty between two sections of the community. Henceforth, Protestants and Roman Catholics will be able each to carry out in harmony their, in some respects, divergent views on education, by their own resources.
