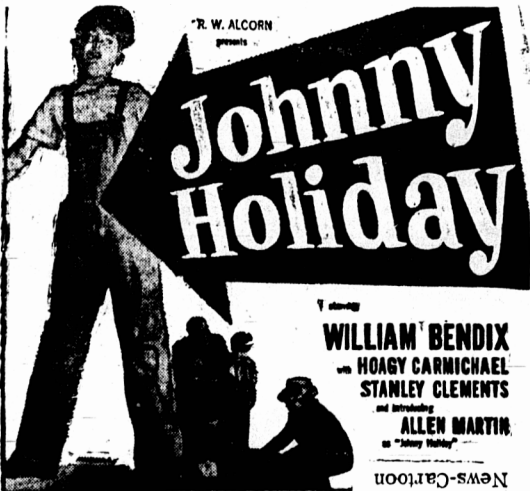

Death Yesterday Of Well Known Montague Man

Word was received in Montague last evening that Mr. Archibald Hume Montague passed away at the Camp Hill Hospital, Halifax, at 5:30 p.m. The late Mr. Hume was 53 years of age. He served in the First World War, going overseas with the 105th Infantry Battalion, and was wounded in active service.

Returning to Montague, he lived here for a number of years, where he engaged in many community activities. He was a charter member and past president of the Montague branch of the Canadian Legion. He was also a member and past master of the Masonic Lodge. He was instrumental in organizing the first Montague Boy Scout troop, of which he remained scout master until 1933. Following the Second World War, he was elected president of the local Boy Scout executive committee.

He was a musician of note, having studied the violin at Mount Allison University, and was band master of the Montague Band which he organized several years ago.

During the Second World War he entertained troops throughout Eastern Canada, and later moved to Toronto. Following the war he returned to Montague where he purchased the former King's County Hospital building which he converted into the Hume Apartments. He became seriously ill in November of last year, and entered Camp Hill where he passed away yesterday evening.

Mr. Hume was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Hume of Iris. He leaves to mourn his wife (nee Georgie Allen), a brother Wallace, Beach Point; and a sister, Mrs. Sadie Penny, Beach Point. To Mrs. Hume the residents of the community extend their deepest sympathy in her sad bereavement.

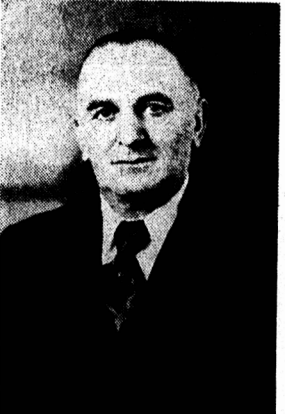
