

Local and Other Items.

SEASONABLE.—Fresh mackerel, shad, halibut, codfish and finnan haddies just received at the Fish Market.

PRINCE OF WALES COLLEGE.—The closing exercises of the Academic Year 1888-89, take place to-morrow at 11 o'clock.

A VALUABLE PURCHASE.—The Brighton Tannery was sold at auction by A. McNeill to-day, and realized \$1,555. Alexander McKinnon, Esq., was the purchaser.

CHARLES WATTS.—This well-known lecturer will speak in Charlottetown, early in July. The subject of his first lecture will be "Religion and Science; their relation to Civilization." Advertisement will appear shortly.

CATTLE SHIPMENT.—Twenty-nine fine cattle were taken over to Point du Chene for Halifax, St. John and other markets, by the Princess last Wednesday morning. Of these twenty were shipped by Mr. Charles McNeill, of Kensington, and nine by Mr. David Keefe. So says the Farmer.

ANOTHER DISASTROUS FIRE.—The greater portion of the village of Bridgewater, in Hastings County, Ont., was destroyed by fire on Saturday. Over twenty dwelling houses were burned, besides stores, the Methodist church and two hotels. There is scarcely any insurance, and the loss is very heavy.

POLICE COURT.—Mrs. Mary E. Heron appeared before His Honor this forenoon, on complaint of Mrs. Sarah Doyle. Mrs. Heron was charged with using abusive and obscene language towards Mrs. Doyle, on Pownall Street, on the 11th and 12th May. The case was adjourned for witnesses until Monday next.

SCOTT ACT CONVICTS.—A correspondent writes: At Mount Stewart, on the 18th inst., before Messrs. James Ross and W. J. Logan, J. P.'s at the suit of D. W. Henderson, Esq., Government Prosecutor, Mike Poor, of Mount Stewart, was convicted and fined in the sum of \$150 with costs, or six months imprisonment for three violations of the Canada Temperance Act.

ALL FOR LOVE.—A St. Thomas, Ont., despatch says: Joseph Mills, aged 21, an English orphan employed as a farm hand with Farmer Merrill, of Delaware, asked the 17-year-old daughter of Farmer Bathurst to marry him. She put him off and accepted the invitation to accompany a rival for a boat ride. Mills returned home and shot himself below the heart. He will die.

PROVINCIAL EXHIBITION, 1889.—The annual general meeting of the Board of Commissioners for managing the General Exhibition of Agriculture and local industry of this Province will be held at the Law Courts Building, Charlottetown, on Friday, June 7th, at 11 o'clock a. m. Railway return tickets at one first-class fare will be issued to Commissioners attended this meeting.

ATTEMPTED BRIBERY.—The St. John Evening Gazette asserts in most positive terms that in an interview with the President of the Sun Publishing Co., asked for by the Solicitor General in the Blair government, that gentleman sought to secure the support of the Sun by the offer of the provincial printing, heretofore enjoyed by the Globe and Telegraph. The offer was indignantly refused.

A VALUABLE CARGO.—We learn from the Farmer that the Ida Maud left Summerside on Wednesday morning. She took 1500 bags of oats for Hon. Mr. Lefebvre, 1400 for Mr. Newbery, and 22 bbls. potatoes. She also took several horses, three of which were shipped by Dr. Bagnall, and two by Mr. Lefebvre. Capt. Purdy will call at the Gut of Canso to take on board three horses which are coming from Halifax. Barbadoes is her destination.

METHODIST.—The annual meeting of the P. E. I. Methodist District will (D. V.) be held at Margate, beginning on Tuesday, June 11th, at 10 o'clock a. m. Lay delegates are not required to be in attendance until Wednesday morning at 9.30 o'clock. On Monday evening there will be a social service; on Tuesday evening, preaching and the Lord's Supper; on Wednesday morning a devotional meeting; and on Wednesday evening a Sabbath School service.

THE RIFLE.—The semi-annual competition of No. 3 Co., 82nd Battalion, came off at Kensington range yesterday afternoon. The attendance was small, and the weather unfavorable for good shooting. Sergt. B. C. Prowse won the cup with a score of 82 points, Captain Stewart coming next with 78. This is, we understand, the third time in succession that Sergt. Prowse has won the cup, and it now becomes his property. We congratulate the young and popular Sergt. on his good shooting.

EVICTIO CONFIAT.—A Dublin despatch says that another conflict took place at Falcarragh on Monday, between evictors and tenants, during which twenty-five policemen were injured. The house was barricaded in the usual way. The police being unable to effect an entrance through the doors, scaling ladders were procured. As the police swarmed up the ladders the inmates rained every manner of missile upon them, and in some cases ladders crowded with officers were thrown violently to the ground. The superior force of the hostlers prevailed and the evictions were finally accomplished.

MORE RELIUS UNREATHED.—On Thursday last, says a Bathurst, N. B., despatch, as Mr. George Murray was digging post holes for the erection of a fence on Mr. Robert Ferguson's property, at Younghall, about two or three miles from town, he unearthed three copper kettles—one large and two small ones, the small ones being covered over by the large one—and an ancient battle axe of metallic composition. Following up the discovery he next unearthed the skeleton of a human being. The skeleton was that of a man of large proportions and is supposed to be the remains of a Spanish sailor, who likely lived with the Indians. Mr. Murray says that he thinks the body must have been interred there over 100 years ago. The depth at which he discovered the skeleton is about three feet, and he says the earth in which it lay was of a very dark hue.

The Inter-State Commission. OTTAWA, May 29. The Inter-State Commerce Commission will likely visit different points in Canada. A meeting will be held in Montreal for the purpose of taking evidence.

Mormon Immigration.

OTTAWA, May 29. In an interview to-day regarding the cry of Mormon entrenchment in the Territories, the Minister of Agriculture said: "The Mormons have cleared large districts of land in the Northwest from speculating companies, and are coming in as any other immigrants would. The constitution of Canada knows no religious differences. Our duty is to encourage immigration and get the country settled. The people are coming in on land bought by them, and they distinctly understand that they have to conform to the laws of the Dominion, especially as regards polygamy. Should they transgress, then they will be immediately prosecuted."

Japan Scourged.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 29. Great fires are reported in Japan, which occurred May 3rd. At Yokoto, one thousand houses were destroyed. About 10,000 people were rendered homeless. The Emperor subscribed over £1,000 out of his purse for the relief of sufferers. Many lives were lost. On Oshama Island a volcanic eruption took place April 13th, and destroyed more than half the houses on the island. A peculiar disease has broken out in Tutedagun, victims dying five hours after being attacked.

Bishop's Death.

NEW YORK, May 29. The coroner's jury in the matter of the inquest into the death of Washington Irving Bishop, found a verdict this evening. The cause of death was coma, while Drs. Irwin, Ferguson and Mance acted in good faith in performing an autopsy upon the deceased. Dr. Irwin, through over-zealousness, acted in some haste respecting the directions of the performance of the autopsy. Coroner Levi discharged the three doctors, who had been in \$2,500 bail each.

"Unredeemed Villains."

OTTAWA, May 29. Joseph Pope, the Premier's Secretary, publishes a letter to-night in which he quotes Canon Littledale asserting that the leaders of the Reformation were a set of "unredeemed villains." The letter has caused a sensation here owing to the fact that Littledale has recently been quoted as the principal authority against the Jesuits.

Dr. Cronin's Death.

CHICAGO, May 29. Two hundred delegates of the Clan-na-Gael, held a meeting last night and adopted a resolution deploring the terrible death of Dr. P. H. Cronin, and solemnly protesting against the evident attempt to place the crime of his death on that order, also pledging their efforts to aid in hunting down the criminals.

New Senator.

MONTREAL, May 29. The appointment of Edward Murphy to the vacancy in the Senate, caused by the death of Hon. Thomas Ryan, will be gazetted Saturday and will be well received generally on account of the wide esteem in which he is held.

Wind and Rain.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., May 29. A hurricane, extending over an extensive range of coast, has prevailed for four days. The rainfall has never been equalled. Railway traffic is suspended. Many landslides occurred, and a number of lives were lost.

OTTAWA, May 29. It has been arranged that the members of the Wimbledon Team will report in Quebec on June 19th. The team will leave on the 20th by the Parisian.
