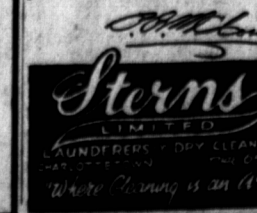

Plans with regard to the Clinics will be made in all churches. On Monday morning a special Clinic will be held at St. Dunstan's University where there will be a demonstration of Blood Donor Week issued by Mayor David Stewart, and the students are again competing with Prince of Wales for the Wilson and Moore "Corpuscle Trophy" which was won by St. Dunstan's last December when they attained 86 percent attendance.

Monday evening's Clinic at the Clover Club will be a private one and is designated as "Union Night". It will go on continuously from 5 until 9 p.m. At 7 p.m. there will be a Parade by Burke's Ladies and Lassie's Band.
