IN MEMORIAM

MR. JOHN M. MacLEOD

There passed away peacefully at his home in Victoria Cross on August 31st, John M. MacLeod in his 49th year. The late Mr. MacLeod was born at Victoria Cross on the 27th day of September, 1903, a son of the late John M. and Alexina MacLeod.

He spent most of his life at Victoria Cross where he conducted farming operations which were interrupted by his service to his country in the Canadian Army Active from 1941 to 1944. It was during his military service that he developed the illness which eventually resulted in his early death.

Mr. MacLeod married Ella Buchanan in 1932. Her loving care and untiring devotion sustained him during his long hours of suffering, which he bore with heroic patience and fortitude.

Although Mr. MacLeod knew for more than a year that his days were numbered, not even his closest friends and relatives were aware of the seriousness of his illness until shortly before his death.

Besides his wife there are left to mourn the loss of a loving father and brother, one son, John Maynard, 14 years of age, and daughters; Mary Margaret, 13 years of age; Ada Doreen, 8 years of age; Betty Ella, 3 years of age, and Barbara Alexina, born July 4th, 1952, all at home; one brother, Malcolm at Victoria Cross; and four sisters: Bessie, Mrs. William Pendercast of Roslindale, Mass.; Margaret of Chestnut Hill, Mass.; Cornelia, Mrs. Joseph Miller, of Roxbury, Mass.; and Catherine, Mrs. William Ferguson, of Lorne Valley, Prince Edward Island. A sister, Ada predeceased him some years ago.

The funeral service, which was held from his home on September 3rd, was conducted by Reverend A. D. MacKenzie, D. D. of the United Church, Montague. Reverend MacKenzie brought a beautiful message of comfort and sympathy.

The Brooklyn Trio consisting of Willard Bruce, Malcolm Munroe and John Bears, very feelingly rendered, "Jesus Lover Of My Soul" a favourite hymn of the deceased. Another favourite hymn, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus", was beautifully rendered by a close friend of the deceased, Willard MacLeod. Mrs. Byron Stewart presided at the organ.

The large concourse of neighbours, relatives, and friends who attended the funeral bore silent tributes to the esteem in which the deceased was held by all who knew him. The many floral tributes, cards and letters of sympathy, and the many words and acts of sympathy and kindness received by the immediate mourners, also bear out the general feeling of loss occasioned by Mr. MacLeod's unexpected passing.

Burial took place in the Montague Cemetery where an impressive memorial service was conducted by the Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L., under the leadership of William Brothers and Malcolm MacKenzie. A feature of this service was "The Lament" rendered by Piper, Percy Groome of Charlottetown.

The pallbearers were, Charles Mellish, Charles MacLeod, Fred Troy, Leo M. O'Halloran, Stewart Adams, and William Ferguson. "He who lives in the hearts of those he loved can never die."
