

Dressen Dies Tigers Grieve

DETROIT (AP) — Charlie Dressen, manager of Detroit Tigers who battled back from two heart attacks only to be stricken by a kidney infection, died Wednesday.

Dressen, who would have been 68 next month, died of a cardiac arrest, said a spokesman at Ford Hospital.

He had entered the hospital last Sunday for treatment of the kidney infection.

Los Angeles Dodgers president Walter O'Malley, who was president when the club was in Brooklyn and won National League pennants in 1955 and 1957 under Dressen, said:

"He was tremendously dedicated to the game of baseball." Frank Skaff, acting manager of the Tigers since another coach, Bob Swift, was stricken with lung cancer, said he and the Tigers were "extremely grieved and heartbroken."

STRICKEN IN 1965
Dressen suffered his first heart attack during spring training in 1965.

He did not return to the bench until May 30, the team being managed by Swift, who coached at third base under Dressen.

Last May 16, Dressen suffered another heart attack and was recuperating when the kidney infection forced him to enter the hospital again.

His managerial career began with Nashville of the Southern Association in 1932. In 1934 Larry McPhail hired him to manage Cincinnati Reds of the National League.

The Reds never finished higher than fifth under Dressen and he returned to Brooklyn in 1938. He coached at Brooklyn from 1938-46 and with New York Yankees in 1947-48.

Second- and first-place finishes while managing Oakland of the Pacific Coast League earned him another managing job in the majors, this time with Brooklyn in 1951.

Lee Takes Gold At BEG Fencers Capture Silver

KINGSTON, Jamaica (CP)—Sharpshooter Jim Lee won a shooting gold medal for Canada, the fencing team added a second-place silver and a Canadian boxer got a third-place bronze at the British Empire Games Wednesday.

Lee, a 30-year-old Vancouver radio-TV repairman, won the shooting gold medal by a single point in the centre-fire pistol competition. He scored 578 points of a possible 600.

The gold, silver and bronze medals raised the Canadian team's total to 28, breaking Canada's record at the 1958 Games at Cardiff, Wales, and coming within three of equalling the total Canadian production four years ago at Perth, Australia.

Canada now has seven golds, 12 silvers and nine bronzes. In 1958, Canada won 27 medals— one gold, 10 silvers and 16 bronzes. The 1962 Canadian total was 31—four golds, 12 silvers and 15 bronzes.

The men's fencing team of John Andru and Konrad Widmaier of Toronto and Peter Bakonyi of Vancouver reached the final round by beating Wales, Jamaica and Australia.

But the classic English team, led by gold medalist Bill Horkyns, defeated Canada in the final 5-0 to win the gold. England now has won six straight golds

in fencing with only the men's individual and team sabre events left.

Clarke won the silver with a score of 575 and Julio Machado of Jamaica was the third-place bronze winner with 571. Gary McMahon of Dartmouth, N.S., was fifth with 569.

Lee's gold, the first for Canada in shooting, was the fifth individual big one won by Vancouver entries.

Against Wales, John Andru, electronics technician from Toronto, had a victory to two defeats and received 14 hits. Konrad Widmaier, computer programmer from Toronto, had a similar 1-2 record with 13 hits. Peter Bakonyi, mortgage manager for a Vancouver real-estate firm, registered three victories to no defeats and received seven hits.

In the round against Jamaica, it was Andru 2-1 with seven hits; Bakonyi 1-1 with eight hits and Widmaier 2-0 with seven hits.

Against Australia, both Andru and Widmaier were 2-0—Andru with seven hits and Widmaier three. Bakonyi had 1-1 with nine hits.

England picked up a gold medal in the early going Wednesday when the women's fencers came through in an event in which Canada had no entry. Australia got the second-place silver and New Zealand the third-place bronze.

Canadians, certain of a medal in the fencing, were confident of further laurels when the women's tower diving finals got today.

"Bev couldn't be in a better position," said coach Irene MacDonald of Vancouver, herself a former international diver.

"The other girls have used up most of their difficult dives, but Bev still has hers to go. She's going to nail them."

Miss Boys performed solidly in Wednesday's diving, but there was no word on the placing of Kathy McDonald of Vancouver, Canada's other entry.

After four dives Wednesday, Miss Boys was 13.50 points behind the leader, Robyn Bradshaw, 19, of Western Australia, and 3.45 points behind Joy Newman of England. Scores were: Bradshaw 265.60, Newman 255.5, Boys 252.10, with Susan Knight of Australia, 251.50.

It was Miss Knight, the defending champion, that Miss Boys beat out of the springboard silver medal last week.

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2 Free-For-Alls To Go Tonight

Tonight the Charlottetown Driving Park presents one of the best looking race cards for many a moon. Two big free-for-alls and the great three-year-old event which has produced some of the top racing for years.

The feature will have Hurrab on the rail and Elmer Ferguson has hopes of keeping the field behind him and the big pacer for the entire mile. J. Scotch Hal, owned by Gordon MacKinnon and fresh from his win in 2:06 at Fredericton on Wednesday with Gerald Noonan driving will leave out of the two spot and this will make the Scotch horse a heavy favorite with the bettors. Lee's Way C who paced in 2:05 2/5 this year with owner Sid Stead will be looking for racing room from the word go and the mare will be tough to head to the wire. Little Art the trotter with the big heart, will be out there tonight to head this field of pacers and will leave for a new track record with Alyre Pineau driving. Jim Fashion, owned and driven by James MacGregor has won his last four starts and many feel that the big son of Hadley Hanover can beat the field to the wire and be a top contender for a Gold Cup invitation. The Greenbrier entry, Eloise Wick will leave from the tough sixth position in this first dash, but the mare can leave and the last two races she is beginning to show the carry of last fall when she was so tough to head through the home lane.

The second free-for-all will have Shotgun Hanover on the rail, Fastway out of second position, Yankee Blaze will leave in the third spot and if Emmett Bernard can get him around that first turn in high we should see a very fast mile in this event, Rose Robin the roan mare handled by Clarke Smith leaves in fourth and Ozark Pete, owned and driven by Sid Stead will be looking for his fourth straight win. Here is a class that could very well produce thrills to surpass the free-for-all.

The early closer three-year-old should produce the best of racing in this type of event. All summer long these horses have been battling each other right down to the wire each and every time out and with four new competitors, Loretta's Boy from Sydney, Miramachi Frisco, Dr. John T. and Miramachi Post from the Dr. Delaney stables at Moncton there should be some very tough racing. Speedy Con who took a new record of 2:08 2/5 will have to get out of there in a hurry to avoid the heavy traffic followed by Dr. John T. and then Pearl Way. Mystery Romeo placed in fifth with the great three-year-old Mr. Jollity on the outside position and Francis MacIsaac will be forced to go all the way as this class has ten starters and the traffic will have a big bearing on the first quarter of this event. Sherma David leaves in the trailing position with Texas Chief eighth, Loretta's Boy in ninth and Miramachi Post in tenth. There are ten big dashes tonight, getting underway at 8 p.m. and this should produce some of the best racing we have had this season at the Charlottetown Driving Park.

Eight top notch races were the order last night for the 1600 fans at the Covehead stock car track.

Thirty-three cars took to a much improved track with the feature 20 lap free-for-all once again providing the biggest thrills of the evening.

Eighteen cars took to the field for the big event but pileups scrubbed six before the fourth lap.

Ralph Brown, driving his big DeSoto, took home the gold with Don Woodbridge taking second place. Elwood Paynter third and Bob Ross fourth.

Brown also took the sixth race, an overhead eight cylinder class, edging out the 57 Dodge of Dave Constable and Fred Smith who came second and third places respectively.

Al MacRae, driving his number 49 Pontiac was also a two event winner, parading flag in the first and fourth races, both six cylinder classes. Frank McCarville and Alan MacCallum finished in second and third positions in the opener and Calvin Campbell and Frank McCarville followed MacRae home in the fourth race.

Race number two, a flathead eight event, was won by Bob Ross with Elwood Paynter taking second money and Kevin Power third.

Fred Smith piloted the Mechanical Man to victory in race three, an overhead event with Wayne Aylward and Jim Scott following him home.

In the fifth race, also a flathead affair, Don Brehaut ramed his Ford home in the number one slot with the efforts of Elwood Paynter and Don Woodbridge giving them second and third places.

Brehaut also won the consolation event, driving the Dodge belonging to Roy Matthews. Ray Birt came to the wire in second place and Waller Campbell followed him in for a third prize.
