A VALUABLE CARGO.—The bark *M. J. Foley*, of P. E. Island, Capt. Townsend, chartered by Mr. I. H. Mathers, cleared yesterday for London, taking 14,427 cases of canned fish and other cargo, making a total value of \$74,491.—*Hal. Chronicle.*

MARY ANN MURPHY, "a bit of an Irish girl," as she styles herself, was arrested on Saturday evening for breaking glass in the Railway office where she had been demanding satisfaction for loss sustained by a Conductor giving her a bogus bank note, in change, while on passage from this city to Moncton. She could not, it appears get the required satisfaction for her loss and becoming violent broke several windows. This morning no prosecutor appeared and she was discharged.

ANTHONY HAMILTON, a boy about twelve years of age, was charged with burglary at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning, by Mr. John Warren, policeman. Mr. Warren, it appears, has been missing goods and money from his shop, which is situated on Fitzroy St., for a number of weeks. He came to the conclusion that his premises had been entered during his absence, and, yesterday, he determined to lay in wait for the thief. He lay quietly hid in his store from early morn, but, until three o'clock, there were no visible signs of the thief. At that time the boy above named entered through the cellar-hatch, and in all haste repaired to the till, extracted a few pieces of silver coin, and was about disappearing through the cellar hatch when Mr. Warren emerged from his hiding place and grasped the youthful thief, who had evidently been plundering his shop for weeks past. The youthful burglar was conveyed to the police station, and this morning the Stipendiary Magistrate sentenced him to one month's imprisonment with hard labor for the offence.

THERE is evidence of this city being at present infested by a gang of skilful—if not professional—burglars and shoplifters. Within the last fortnight we have heard many reports of burglaries and larcenies in the centre, as well as the suburbs, of the city. On Saturday night a most daring burglary was committed. A store on one of our public squares was entered by the front door and the burglars escaped with a large booty. On Thursday night the door of a store on the corners of Great George and Cent Streets, was almost forced open. This attempt at burglary was even more daring than the first mentioned—a blazing gas lamp stood ten yards from the door upon which the burglars operated with impunity. They were not disturbed and only left the premises from sheer inability to enter, owing to the strong fastenings on the door. These are two instances among many which we could quote. That the city is wholly unprotected from burglars is a fact which cannot be denied at present, and this will in the immediate future, if a radical change does not take place, be clearly apparent to all. We shall see what our City Fathers have to say about this matter to-night.
