

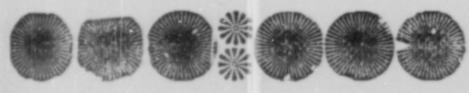

### WOMEN'S COUNCIL.

The regular monthly meeting of the Women's Council was held in Prince of Wales College, Saturday afternoon. Mrs. C. C. Gardiner, Mrs. Benj. Rogers and Mrs. Edward Bayfield were appointed delegates to the annual meeting of the National Council of Women of Canada, to be held in Victoria, B. C., July next.

A vote of thanks was tendered the city press for their kindness in advertising and placing notices for the Women's Council in their daily papers. The President reported having received from His Honor the Governor the necessary permits for Mrs. J. E. B. McCready and Mrs. C. C. Gardiner, the committee appointed by this Council to visit the Asylum for Insane, the Poor House and Jail.

A petition from the Council was sent to His Worship the Mayor and the City Council, asking that a bye law be passed compelling employers to provide better sanitary accommodation for the female employees in the city. The possibility of establishing an Old Ladies' Home was discussed and a committee was appointed to see what arrangements could be made and to report at the April meeting.

The Treasurer reported that the Epworth League of the First Methodist Church had withdrawn from its affiliation with the Council.

The question of substituting quarterly meetings for the monthly meetings of Council was considered, but it was decided to continue the monthly sessions until further notice.

The Treasurer was instructed to send the annual affiliation fee of five dollars to the National Council. Adjourned.

### Delagoa Bay Award.

WASHINGTON, March 31.—The dissatisfaction expressed in England at the findings of the Delagoa Bay arbitration is sharply reflected in Washington, and there are no lack of intimations that the decision is by no means the end of this celebrated case. The findings, as it is represented to the government, have simply resulted in a decree that, if observed, would plunge England and the United States in protracted litigation in the endeavor to satisfy the just claims of the claimants to the money out of a sum totally inadequate for the purpose. It has been pointed out that the arbitrators themselves have paved the way for a refusal of the principals to accept the verdict through their refusal to permit a re-assessment of the damages sustained, as was contemplated in the original order, and there are believed to be other irregularities that would afford ample ground for a refusal by the two governments representing the claimants to accept the arbitration. It is suggested, however, that the result of such action would be to still further prolong the decision of the time consuming case, as recourse must then be had to another tribunal. It is not yet determined what shall be done. The state department refuse to state their purpose until they receive a copy of the verdict of the arbitrators from an official source. Possibly the brief preliminary decision announced at Berné may not be regarded as satisfying the requirements, and the extended verdict referred to as forthcoming hereafter may be awaited before action is taken.

**THE STANLEY.**—The Stanley's freight for Pictou today included 207 cases eggs, 113 cases ham, 319 cases canned goods, 292 empty cases, 139 barrels pork, 39 quarters beef, 6 carcasses mutton, 44 dressed hogs, 74 packages sundries, 9 horses. She had ten passengers.
