Plan Largest Spraying Project

FREDERICTON (CP) - The largest aerial spraying project ever to be undertaken is scheduled for New Brunswick early this summer when 215 aircraft will spray insecticide over 5,000,000 acres of timberland in the northern section of the province.

Announcement of the huge project was made here Wednesday by officials of Forest Protection Limited - a federal, provincial and which held its annual meeting here.

The spraying project follows six years of attempts to prevent extensive damage to the forest by spruce bud-worms. Aerial sprays are recognized by government and industry as the most effective weapon in combating the pests.

More than 2,500,000 gallons of insecticide will be sprayed by the huge aerial armada. The planes will operate from 14 airfields constructed for the purpose.

The date for the beginning of the operation has not yet been set. But preliminary preparation work is getting under way so that airfields and supplies will be ready when the project begins.
