Battle Over Track Control Does Not Interest Beach

The running fight between the Amateur Athletic Union and National Collegiate Athletic Association over control of track and field in the United States doesn't interest Pete Beach "one little bit." That's what he says.

"We don't care what they do down there," the track and field committee chairman of the AAU of Canada said in an interview in Toronto. "We have no interest whatsoever in their squabbles."

But Beach and his committee are nevertheless vitally concerned, because there are about 50 Canadian track and field athletes going to colleges in the U.S. This is set forth in a memorandum Beach issued to all members of his track and field committee a couple of weeks ago.

"No Canadian in the U.S. can take part in competition in the U.S. unless it is an AAU-sanctioned meet," Beach said in the interview. And in his memo he told committee members to find the names and location of athletes of their provincial branches who may be at school in the U.S. and make them aware of the facts.

"In this way you can assist them in protecting their international eligibility."

His memorandum pointed out that, according to the International Amateur Athletic Federation and the International Olympic Committee rules, "there can be only one recognized body governing a specific sport in any one country."

The memo added: "The body in the United States recognized as the governing body for track and field activities is the Amateur Athletic Union."

"Insofar as the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada is concerned, we have two specific responsibilities to our competing athletes:

"(a) We must abide by the rules and regulations of the International Amateur Athletic Federation of which both Canada and the United States are members;

"(b) We must strictly protect the international eligibility of all our Canadian athletes."

FACE SUSPENSION

The memo added that any Canadian athlete who competes in meets in the U.S. not approved by the AAU of the U.S. will "incur suspension and will be barred from international competition until such suspension is lifted."

"Canadians attending school in the U.S. come under this ruling."

Beach and other track officials in Canada aren't particularly worried about a track and field federation being organized in this country in opposition to the AAU.
