### Gerry James Will Go To Bombers After NHL Season

TORONTO (CP)—When Toronto Maple Leafs sent a posse to flush a fellow named James out of the West they got more than they expected. They're amazed. And frustrated. The James wasn't Jesse. He was Gerry, alias the football full-back with Winnipeg Blue Bombers, who has developed into one of Leafs' few redeeming features in the current National Hockey League season. Leafs figured James would help them in the brawny department but they didn't expect him to take a starring role in fifth place and with little hope of making a Stanley Cup playoff position. Leafs are frustrated because Gerry still insists football is his future. Hockey, for the time being anyway, is a mere sideline for cash. Toronto coach Billy Reay sounded out James on his career last week. James gave the same old reply. **SAME OLD STAND** "My plans are all in Winnipeg. I don't even know why I figure in Leaf plans. It was strictly busi-

ness that brought me back here; not any idea of a hockey future. The club thought I had something it could use and I figured it had something I could use." Leafs were interested in James' muscle. James wanted Leaf dollars. "At first I thought the rest of team was so bad it made him look good," says Stafford Smythe, acting manager. "But now I'm certain he's as good as he looks. The biggest mistake this club ever made was in letting him get away to football for the sake of \$2,000." Leafs have wanted James, a 23-year-old right winger who stands six feet and weighs 185 pounds, since he joined their chain years ago. But he's always gone with the Bombers in the Western Football Conference, yielding to Leaf contract bait only after the grid season ends. Leafs lined him up after the 1957 football campaign and Gerry was sent to Rochester, a Toronto farm team in the American League, to get in shape. He moved up to Leafs three weeks ago. "They told me he couldn't skate," said Reay. "But I can't see anything wrong with his skating. They said he couldn't score, but he got two goals in his first four games. "He works hard and checks hard and by making the opposition look for him, he has helped Billy Harris (James' centre) get untracked again." Flattery won't get Leafs anywhere. James will ride West again when the season is finished. "They're just using me right now, the same as any other organization," he says. "I'd be willing to come back again next year—after the football season. "But I still don't feel I'm good enough to make a 10-year career out of hockey."

### Heated Controversy Over Batting Helmets Going On

TAMPA, Fla. (AP)—American League president Will Harridge stepped into the Ted Williams-no helmet controversy Tuesday by siding with the league's umpires in the wearing of protective headgear by all players is mandatory. This may force a showdown over whether Williams, great Boston Red Sox slugger, will don a protective helmet or what exactly constitutes a "protective device" for a batter. Williams has refused to wear a helmet. He has said: "I'm not going to wear one of those space helmets. It bothers my hitting." However, Williams, who led the majors in batting last year with a .388 average, advises other players to wear helmets. What happens then was not made clear. The league passed a headgear rule at meetings last December. The Red Sox dissented because general manager Joe Cronin knew Williams wouldn't go for it. The rule already is on the National League books. Before Harridge issued his bulletin, Cronin said there will not be any trouble over the rule. **CAP PROTECTION ENOUGH** "The rule merely states a player must wear protective headgear. Well, as far as the Red Sox are concerned, the ordinary baseball cap will constitute enough protection around the head." New York Yankees sponsored the legislation and manager Casey Stengel said Tuesday it is up to Harridge to enforce it. "If it's a rule, it must go for all players," said Stengel. "I don't care whether Williams wears one or not. He'll hit .350 or .400 anyway. But if I had a player worth \$800,000, I'd want my investment protected. They (the Red Sox) won't draw 500 people without him."

LONDON (Reuters) — Britain imported \$71,000,000 worth of gold from Russia last year, the House of Commons was told Tuesday. The year's total imports of gold amounted to £300,000,000.

### Jockey Has Nasty Spill

ARCADIA, Calif. (AP)—Jockey Willie Shoemaker took a nasty spill in the fourth race at Santa Anita Tuesday, but escaped with cuts, bruises and a bad shaking up. The veteran jockey, aboard Naboo, was caught in a jam at the first turn of the 1-16-mile race. The field of 12 was badly bunched and fighting for the lead. Shoemaker tried to take Naboo through on the inside and the horse tripped over the heels of Media Via. Shoemaker tumbled to the track near the rail. Two other horses — Charley M. and Counter Punch — ran over him. Track movies showed that the horses did not actually step on the little jockey.
