Winter Communications.

The great importance to this Island of having the best available means of communicating with the mainland during winter is, at this season, most apparent. Many anxious travellers are delayed and disappointed; the conveyance of the mails is obstructed; large quantities of produce, in grain, meat, etc., which could be sent to market if the means were provided, will remain unsold in the hands of traders and farmers until spring. For want of better facilities, the Island, every year, loses largely in many ways.

Now, if we do not intend to rest satisfied with the facilities we possess, it strikes us that the present would be a good time to call meetings to discuss this important subject. The inhabitants of several parts of the mainland are now, we observe, meeting and reasoning together with a view of getting steamers and railways for their benefit. Should not we, also, consult together for the purpose of forwarding our interests in this regard?

The men who provided the Princess of Wales and St. Lawrence are deserving of great praise for the enterprise they have displayed; but, though as comfortable as possible in the fine weather of summer, the Princess of Wales and St. Lawrence are, it is admitted, not suited to the turbulent waters of the Straits in the fall and early winter. A good screw boat is now required; and, who are the public-spirited men willing to run the risk of meeting this want?

Then, as to the route by which fall and winter communication shall be kept up? To the public generally, it must seem that the shortest route is the best route. Now the shortest route is "between the Capes"; and to the Capes there is, at present, no branch lines of railway making connections with the existing means of travel and trade. Besides these, the required landing places are wanting. Therefore, this route cannot now be used except in the very limited way admitted of by the ice boats. But, judging by the "viva" with which the people of Westmoreland and Cumberland are agitating for a branch of the Intercolonial from Amherst to Cape Tormentine, it is probable that, on the mainland, the facilities required will be provided in the course of a few years. Nor do we think that, if an anxious unanimity were expressed by the people of the Island, very many years would pass away before the Cape Traverse Branch and the other facilities required, were provided. As an inter-provincial work, as a means of connecting their Railway on the mainland with their Railway on this Island, as a means of affording prompt and regular carriage of the mails, as a means of enabling them to fully carry out the terms of the Union, by which they are bound to provide "efficient steam service for the conveyance of mails and passengers * * * thus placing the Island in continuous communication with the Inter-continental Railway and the railway system of the Dominion—this scheme must commend itself to the attention of the general Government.

The Water Famine.

SCARCITY of water is reported from all parts of the country. Nearly all the wells have long been dry, and many springs which never failed before are failing now. It is said that some farmers have to go miles for water for their households and stock. The hope that before the winter finally set in, there would be the usual rain fall, may now, apparently, be given up; and there is nothing for it but husband carefully the limited supply of water vouchsafed, and wait for relief. Farmers who have plenty of turnips and potatoes may partially supply the wants of their cattle by liberally feeding them with these roots.

Potatoes Frozen.

It is reported that Jack Frost has entered, many cellars throughout the country, and spoiled the potatoes therein. When will farmers learn not to neglect or put off the most important work of the fall, viz.: making their cellars frost-proof.
