**Mining Association Suggests Exchange Reserves In Gold**

OTTAWA (CP) — The Canadian Metal Mining Association should start keeping Canada's official exchange reserves largely in the form of gold, with just enough U.S. dollars for a working balance. The association told the royal

commission on banking and finance that the gold proportion of the reserves fell to 46 per cent about a year ago and now is up to 60 per cent—not so much from acquiring gold as losing U.S. dollars. As the reserves are rebuilt following the exchange crisis, the association said, the gold proportion should increase to

about 80 per cent of the total. The total reserves at Aug. 31 were \$2,330,000,000. Prudence suggests such a step, the association added if forecast an increase in the price of gold, now held at \$33 U.S. a fine ounce. And it said the drain on American gold stocks raises the possibility of a devaluation of the U.S. dollar.

W. S. Row, president of Kerr-Addison Gold Mines Limited, noted that U.S. treasury officials have said every effort will be made to maintain the established gold price—unchanged for 30 years. But he said international circumstances in a step, the association added. It

The association — representing most of the operating mines in Canada — contended that gold is being produced in insufficient quantities for gold to play "adequately" its role as an accepted medium of exchange and in final settlements. Only half the \$3,500,000,000 of gold newly mined in the free world in the last three years had gone into official monetary reserves, with the other half being hoarded by individuals or used in jewelry.

**RESERVES INSUFFICIENT**  
This meant that official reserves had risen only 1.34 per cent a year while free-world trade had climbed 7.1 per cent at the same time. Thus without a price increase, "gold is progressively less able to do the work required of it."

This "critical situation" will be worsened as Western trade volume rises and with development of the European Common Market, the association said.

However, Commissioner W. Thomas Brown, Vancouver investment dealer, noted that the association's view is opposite to that of some international monetary economists—heard earlier by the commission—who said there is enough, or perhaps too much, international liquidity at present.

Mr. Brown also reminded the association that gold is concerned with trade differences—

**N.Y. Markets Advance First Time In 3 Weeks**

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market advanced a step last week for the first time in three weeks. All five sessions were characterized by a general lack of public interest.

The improvement was far from overpowering although the popular market averages all showed gains.

The Associated Press average of 40 stocks was up 3 at 223.8. The Dow Jones industrial average gained 4.98 but the 65-stock average was ahead only 48. Standard and Poor's 500-stock index picked up .51 at 58.29.

There was some major business-economic news but in general it failed to influence the market to any important degree. Unrest over the Cuban situation centred on the Russian threat of a nuclear war and President Kennedy's reply that although there was no serious threat at his time the U.S. would protect itself.

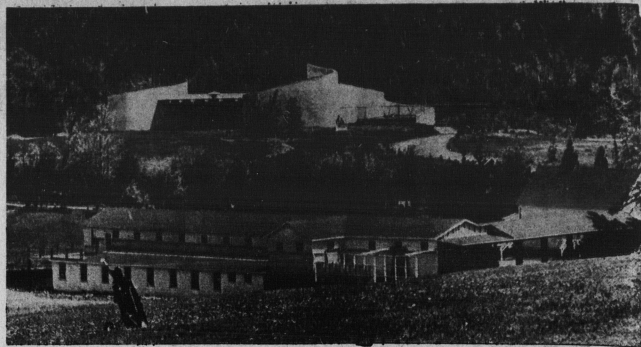
**VOLUME LOWER**
