

Dodgers Defeat Flyers 5-2 In City League Opener

Lean by Eddy Lund's booming bat and Donnie MacLean's pitching the Jack Reedy coached W. G. Barbour's Dodgers defeated the M.C.A. Flyers 5-2 in a well played opening game of the City Baseball League at Memorial Field last night.

Lund drove in three runs on a homer and two singles as he collected three of the Dodgers seven hits. He smashed a drive to the right field fence in the second inning for a single and then walked the ball out of the park for a two run homer in the fourth. In the sixth inning he hit another single.

Jack Reedy, playing second base in place of ailing Chuck Kennedy, collected two hits in the Dodgers victory. Phil Venoit and pitcher Donnie MacLean were the other Dodger hitters.

MacLean hurled five hit ball in beating Vern Handrahan in a good pitchers' duel. MacLean sent 13 men down swinging while young Handrahan whiffed nine.

The Flyers scored both their runs in the fourth inning to take a temporary 2-1 lead. Dunn went to first after being hit by a pitch and scored on catcher Forbes Kennedy's triple into centerfield. Kennedy later scored on an error.

Kennedy led the Flyers assault on MacLean by collecting two of his team's five hits. Bobby Lund, Ken MacDonald and Vern Handrahan also hit for the Flyers.

Kenny MacDonald doubled into right field in the ninth inning for the Flyers' last hit. Eddy Lund, attempting to field the ball, was injured and forced to retire from the game.

Vern Handrahan was replaced on the mound by Donnie MacLean in the eighth inning. MacLean gave up one hit, one run and one walk in the inning he worked.

Over the first seven innings Handrahan surrendered six hits,

struck out nine and walked three in another impressive performance. MacLean gave up a single to lead-off batter Bobby Lund in the first inning and then held the opposition hitless until Kennedy tripled in the fourth. Handrahan got a single in the fifth and Kennedy another single in the sixth. MacLean obtained the next and last hit in the ninth.

The Dodgers pitcher showed good control. He did not walk a man and erred only in hitting one batter.

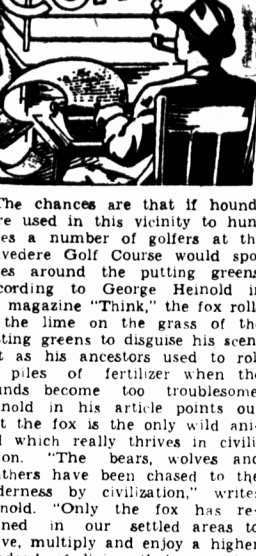
The Legion were granted one week in which to secure a replacement for Gus Gustavson who has been called to his home in Ontario due to the death of his mother.

The chances are that if hounds were used in this vicinity to hunt foxes a number of golfers at the Belvedere Golf Course would spot foxes around the putting greens. According to George Heindol in the magazine "Think," the fox rolls in the lime on the grass of the putting greens to disguise his scent just as his ancestors used to roll in piles of fertilizer when the hounds become too troublesome.

Heindol in his article points out that the fox is the only wild animal which really thrives in civilization. "The bears, wolves and panthers have been chased to the wilderness by civilization," writes Heindol. "Only the fox has remained in our settled areas to thrive, multiply and enjoy a higher standard of living than ever before."

Stock Car Races

The National Rifle Association Hunter Safety Plan, which has been so successful in many parts of the United States, will be one of the main matters under consideration. John Dodge of New Hampshire will describe how the Plan was introduced into that State and tell about the success it has met with in the saving of accidents and lives. Under the plan all young hunters are required to pass a uniform test before receiving a license.

A hunting accident prevention programme has been the objective of the Maritime Wildlife Federation since its inception four years ago. Prince Edward Island has been remarkably fortunate but Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are faced with a steady toll of hunting casualties each year. The Maritime Federation of Fish and Game Associations will have achieved a major accomplishment if it lays the groundwork for a workable plan to save lives. We wish them every success in their endeavours.
