Planes Return
To Summerside

Three of the aircraft which left
Summerside R. C. A. F. Station on
Tuesday to ferry fifty naval per-
sonnel from Halifax to Winnipeg
to help with flood control meas-
ures, returned to Summerside yes-
terday afternoon after only getting
as far as Montreal. It had
originally been planned that they
would go all the way but the R. C.
A. F. Transport Squadron took over
at Dorval and transported the men
the rest of the way.
A fourth aircraft from Summ-
erside, which is participating in fight
against the flooded Red River, is
still on the job as far as is known.
It left Summerside on Monday,
picked up some blankets and a life
ratt at Halifax and continued on
to Winnipeg. At present it is be-
lieved to be occupied transporting
sand bags to that city from other
points.

Powdered Fish
Proves Failure

OTTAWA, May 10 - (CP) -
Because of "discouraging results"
during the war, no further re-
search is planned in the near fu-
ture on developing powdered fish
as a protein food concentrate.
The Fisheries Department gave
this information to Dr. Donald
Smith (L-Queens-Sherburne) in a
reply to questions tabled in the
Commons today.
During the war, the Ministry ad-
vised, research was carried on at
the Fisheries Experimental Sta-
tions in Halifax and Vancouver,
in conjunction with similar work by
the Governments of Newfoundland
and the United States and the
United Kingdom.
