EXTENSION OF TIME

FOR LOBSTER FISHING.

Our correspondent "Point Prim" wants information concerning the extension of time for lobster fishing. That the time has been extended within the section extending from Carleton Head to West Cape is true enough. From Hansard of this session, page 6292, we quote:

Mr. McLellan (by Mr. Gibson) asked: 1. Has the Minister of Marine and Fisheries determined upon any extension of the lobster fishing season for Prince Edward Island.

2. If so, in what localities will such extension apply this year?

3. What will be the limit of such extension.

The Minister of Marine and Fisheries (Sir Louis Davies.) I beg to reply: 1. Yes, to report to Council favourably. 2. To those localities defined by the report of the lobster Commission between West Point and Carleton Head in Northumberland Strait. 3. Up to and including the 31st day of July.

Why it was not also extended along the southern coast of this Province eastward is a question which Sir Louis Davies may be able to answer to the satisfaction of his friends at St. Peter's Island, Orwell, Point Prim, Piquette, High Bank, etc. As to the fairness of extending the time in the first named section and withholding the extensions in the last named section, we solicit the opinions of the packers. Are the conditions in the one very different from those in the other? We have no doubt that Mr. Alexander Martin, M.P., will make good use of any reliable information that can be obtained respecting the necessity of the change; and the packers interested would do well to correspond with him.

WEEDS.

EVERY year, for many years past, we have called attention to the weeds, the disgrace of our fields, and called for concerted and special efforts to kill them in these localities in which—as in the vicinity of Charlottetown—they have obtained headway. It is pleasing to note that this initiative, this year, has been taken by the practical farmer who writes to THE EXAMINER regarding wild mustard. Not only wild mustard, but the daisy, the thistle, and other weeds, demand the attention of our farmers.

HOW TO GET TO CHARLOTTETOWN

The steamer Halifax leaves Boston for Charlottetown every Saturday at noon and will be due at Charlottetown on Monday night. On the following Tuesday at one she will leave on return to Boston. Halifax and Port Hawkesbury are called at every trip. Passengers may take the steamer at any of the ports mentioned. The Halifax will be supplemented by the Grand Duchess later in the season.

The steamer City of Ghent plys between Halifax and Charlottetown each week, calling at several ports en route. She is due here every Thursday.

The steamers Coban, Bonavista, Campana, Tiber and Polino, of Montreal, also make Charlottetown a port of call.

Passengers for this Province coming by way of Picton are brought to Charlottetown by the steamer Princess. Those coming by way of Point Du Chene connect with the steamer Northumberland, and may come through to Charlottetown by the mail special which leaves Summerside each evening immediately after the steamer reaches that port.
