# Harness Racing Heading For Big Season In The U.S.

WESTBURY, N. Y. (AP)—Harness racing, lifted from the quiet country fair environment and plunked down into the swirl of metropolitan New York in 1940, is heading for another successful season—locally and nationally.

Roosevelt Raceway, which began the night harness sport in 1940, opened its 108-night 1953 season with a record-smashing first-night betting turnover Monday to continue the golden boom started April 15 at Yonkers Raceway.

While the rains in the early evening held the attendance to 15,352, the wagering was \$94,194. This cracked the old opening-night mark of \$86,404 set last year for Roosevelt.

Attendance Up  
Yonkers closed Saturday after a 34-day meeting. Attendance was up 10 per cent over the spring of 1952 and betting jumped 17 per cent.

For the first time in New York, Sport Is Spreading  
Harness racing with pari-mutuel betting is spreading to 12 states with 32 tracks. There are more than 450 small state and county fair tracks where pari-mutuel wagering is not legalized.

The 1952 record year showed attendance of 7,913,344 for the pari-mutuel tracks, up 37.35 per cent from 1948. Pari-mutuel handle was \$372,688,886, an increase of 86.20 per cent from 1948; and revenue to the states was \$20,231,427, an increase of 138.56 per cent above 1948.
