Speaker Sees Mental Illness As Worst Health Problem

"One of every 10 people on the North American continent will spend some time in a mental hospital," delegates to the organizational meeting of the P.E.I. division of the Canadian Mental Health Association were told last night.

In pointing up the seriousness of Canada's mental health problem Dr. Robert O. Jones, professor of psychiatry at Dalhousie University, told the group that one out of every 250 residents of Canada were patients in the nation's mental hospitals in 1957 and the number of yearly admissions are steadily growing.

"These figures show," Dr. Jones added, "mental illness is the most serious and significant problem facing the nation today."

More than 100 people representing many of the Island's districts attended the meeting at which Arthur H. Peake of Charlottetown was elected the first president of the Island division.

OFFICERS NAMED
Vice-presidents named were Robert Schurman of Summerside for Prince County; Mrs. Frank Ross of Charlottetown for Queens and Ralph Beck of Montague for Kings.

J.E. Ready of Charlottetown was elected secretary and Frank MacDonald also of the city was named treasurer.

Dr. Jones told the members that although the number of persons being admitted to mental hospitals is going ever upward the rate of stay in hospitals and the number of mental patients now in hospitals has been showing a decrease during the past few years.

"This strange phenomena is the result of better staffing of such hospitals which allows for more effective treatment," the speaker said.

This, he noted, was one of the great contributions that a lay society in the community could make toward the betterment of mental health - to help in the never ending effort to obtain well trained staff for local hospitals.

IMPORTANT ITEM
A good staff, he felt, was probably the most important single item in the treatment of mental patients.

"While the mental health problem is enormous," he said, "our knowledge about the disease itself is remarkably insignificant."

He stated research has barely scratched the surface of the problem and said this is another area in which the divisions of the association can help enormously "in this terribly unhappy health field."

A vote of thanks to Dr. Jones was extended by Dr. J.C. Theriault. He was introduced by Dr. A.J. Murchison, superintendent of Riversdale Hospital.

PLEDGES SUPPORT
Dr. Hubert MacNeill, minister of health, told the members that the Island government was ready to aid the association in its efforts to promote better mental health on the Island.

Roy D. Cosmon, executive director of the New Brunswick division of the CMHA outlined the details of the makeup of the CMHA throughout Canada pointing out that with the forming of a division on P.E.I. only Newfoundland is now without one and steps are already being taken to organize an association there.

He also gave a brief outline of the work to be done and the projects to be undertaken by the P.E.I. division.
