WILL THEY DO IT?

REFERRING to the enormous increase of expenditure by the Dominion Government. The Grenfell Sun, a Liberal paper says: "We must confess that in view of the economy plank in the Ottawa Liberal platform, the Dominion estimates for next year nearly take away our breath. \$49,068,319.85 for the main estimates brought down in March, \$7,244,135 supplementary estimates last week in June, and \$3,493,200 railway subsidies brought down last Thursday, make in all the magnificent showing, so far, of \$59,805,626. Now if that isn't a satisfactory rate of progress for the go-ahead Tory, we don't know what is. But it utterly flabbergasts the old-fashioned Liberals."

The Tribune, of Winnipeg, also a Liberal newspaper, directs attention to this protest of the Grenfell Sun and says: "We are not, however, surprised that the Sun is appalled by the tremendous and yearly increasing expenditure. Since the Sun article was printed \$338,776 more supplementary estimates have been brought down, making a total of \$60,144,302, or about \$60 for every man in Canada, to be taken from the people, which the Government asks Parliament to vote this year. The average farmer in Manitoba will pay a good deal more than \$60 of it. During the past year, large as was the current expenditure, the revenue, that is, the amount taken from the people, was many millions of dollars more; and we are actually asked to applaud this 'surplus.' A few years ago Sir Richard Cartwright and other members of the Government denounced an expenditure of thirty-five millions as monstrously large, and it was pointed out that surpluses could be obtained by the simple process of levying more taxes than are required. Also that the thing to aim at was not to get large surpluses by imposing needless taxation, but to arrange the taxation so there would be a small surplus. What would the rate-payers of a municipality think if a Council accustomed to take a revenue of \$20,000 a year from taxation began to take \$40,000 a year, and to have surplus of \$8,000 or \$10,000 every year, which is immediately voted, away in subsidies—granting one man a bonus of \$2,000 to establish a store, another man \$1,000 for a blacksmith shop and another \$4,000 so he could enlarge his premises and keep out competition? A portion of the new expenditure is in the Klondyke, and new expenditure there was unavoidable, though it may be doubted whether the small population of that territory necessitated a Government expenditure of \$3,000,000 per annum, making every allowance for higher prices. Leaving that out of the question, the estimates are undoubtedly extravagant, and, what is worse, they represent a great degree money taken from the people not for necessary or for beneficial purposes, but for enriching plunderers and for corrupting and debasing the public life of a nation, for enslaving the press, and for strengthening forces most deadly to everything in a nation that makes its existence worth while. One defender of the present rate of expenditure says that the people are richer and can afford to spend more. That is certainly true of some of the people, and especially of railway promoters. But how many of the great mass of the people are making \$60 now for every \$35 or even \$40 that they were making a few years ago? Is the income of the average farmer or workman this year half as much again as it was a few years ago?"

These are words of which the farmers of Prince Edward Island would do well to take heed. The question at the close of the quotation is one which comes home to every voter. Our farmers have the right and the power to put a stop to the carnival of expenditures in which these reckless ministers are now indulging. Will they do it?

A LIVE LIBERAL.

The Macgregor Herald, a Liberal newspaper asks: "Are the Liberals going to the polls with no clear cut issues to lay before the electorate? Is the experience gained at the local elections to have no weight in preparing for the coming contest? Are we to go to the polls with nothing but the record of the Government? In other words, do principles count, or is the fight to be merely one for place and power between the Liberal and Conservative leaders? An election cry of 'Laurier and the great Liberal party,' with nothing to back it, is useless. To go before the electors with that alone is to court defeat. A convention of Manitoba Liberals is as absolute necessity. Nothing but a full, fair, and unfettered convention will meet the situation, and now is the time to prepare for it."

The Macgregor Herald is alive to the interests of its party and anxious concerning it. All honest and thoughtful Liberals are in agreement with the Herald.

The funeral procession which formed on Sunday evening was unusually large; and wended its solemn way to St. Ann's Church, Lot 65, where the last rites were celebrated by the pastor, Rev. D. B. Reid, and all that was mortal of a good man was left to rest. Let us be consoled by the thought that when the trumpet sounds the final summons, we will all be united in endless bliss; for—

"To murmur against death in petulant defiance Is never for the best. To will what God doth will; that is the only science Which gives us rest."

We miss thee from our home, dear John, We miss thee from this place; A shadow o'er our homes is cast We miss the sunshine of thy face, We miss thy kind and willing hand Thy fond and earnest care: Our home is dark without thee dear John, We miss thee everywhere.

NATIONAL WAIF'S MAGAZINE

In the June issue of the National Waifs' Magazine—the organ of the National Waifs' Association—otherwise known as Dr. Barnardo's Homes—Mr. Barnardo has a crowded story to tell of a huge task and of inadequate means to cope with it. "Each year," writes Dr. Barnardo, "the field widens; the young recruits from waifdom increase. Today I have over 5,300 recruits in my rescued army. Every week 60 more are added, and my gates can never be shut. Last year was the greatest year in my annals; it saw no fewer than 3,011 freshly and freely admitted to the Homes." A considerable space in this issue is absorbed by the Annual Report for 1899, just presented to the Council of the Association. This document contains a wonderful series of statistics, indicating the progress of the Homes and the large development which they have attained. The "Personal Notes" are, as usual, full of interest to all social reformers. They are admirably illustrated from photographs. NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Spain withdrew her minister from Peking a short time ago, accepting the fact that she no longer needed to pose as one of the great powers. Spain is happy now.

It is remarked by the Halifax Herald that the publication of the Hutton-Hughes correspondence showed Hutton to be quite superior to any small personal animosities; and the recent news over the death of Lieutenant Borden speaks strongly in the same direction. The manner in which the ministerial head of the Militia Department treated General Hutton is well known and yet, according to recent African despatches, the man who took occasion twice to report Lieutenant Borden to the commander-in-chief for gallant conduct in the field, was the same man whom Lieutenant Borden's father did his best to drive out of Canada.

It is reported that the Chinese Ambassador at Berlin and his subordinates are still in fear of their lives. They avoid the streets, and may be seen at all times of the day peering from behind the windows of the Embassy. The people of Berlin, however, do not desire the lives of the Chinese representatives, but demand indemnity from China for the murder of their Minister and the summary punishment of his murderers. The staff of the Chinese Embassy have not received their salaries for some time, and tradesmen, in consequence, are refusing to supply them with the necessities of life. The Embassy itself is wearing an increasingly denuded appearance.
