Klondike Nugget: Few acts of any government have called for more severe and just condemnation from a free people than the quartering upon them of armed soldiery in time of peace. CITY SCHOOL BOARD.—The regular monthly meeting of the City School Board was held last evening. The estimates of expenditure were submitted and adopted. The total amount estimated is \$10,090, of which \$3,860.45 is for teachers' supplements. A letter from Miss Lucy Lefurgey asking that she be appointed instructor of reading and physical culture in the city schools was considered. The Secretary was instructed to advise Miss Lefurgey that the Board was not in a position to engage her as she was not a regularly licensed teacher. A letter was read from Bishop Macdonald regarding the opening of an additional room on the third floor of Queen Square School. The property committee was authorized to arrange with His Lordship for the opening and heating of the room and was also authorized to furnish the same. The teachers reports showed an enrollment of 1348 for the month of January and an actual attendance of 1329.

LANDMARKS GONE.—The death of the late Dr. Gillis recalls the fact that during the past five or six years, Summerside has lost no less than four doctors by death, namely, Drs D G Mackay, P McN Bearisto, H F Jarvis and J F Gillis. Dr Mackay died in the spring of 1893, and since that date, many other old landmarks of the town have passed away, amongst those names we recall being Messrs James Green, Jeremiah Macarthur, Wm J Gay, Gilbert Richard, Edward Dowling, Dr T H Heckman, Nicholas Watson, Daniel Stewart, James Gourlie, John Martin, Patrick Lanigan, Charles Donahoe, Capt Thos. Welsh, Philip R Baker, Elias Bishop, S M Graves, Roderick Gillis, Martin H Finley, John Green, Chas. B Saunders, John Arbuckle, James Crozier, George Sheen, Patrick Creighan, Daniel Munroe, Samue Farrant, George Cannon, Daniel Enman, Hon W G Strong, Alex C Macdonald and John Baker. There are doubtless many other names which might be added to the above list, but which we do not at the present writing call to mind. We must, however, mention Capt Roderick Cameron and Parser Alex. Macdonald, of the steamer Northumberland, who were for years as much the citizens of Summerside as of Charlottetown.—Agriculture.


