### Joins Princess For Her Lessons

LONDON (Reuters) — Princess Anne has had the company of two little girls at her lessons in Buckingham Palace since Prince Charles returned to his own school May 1, a palace spokesman revealed Monday.

The other girls, who will be seven in August, complained that she did not like doing lessons by herself.

So the Queen invited two children her daughter's age to share the palace schoolroom.

One of the girls, Susan Banning-Smith, also is the daughter of a director of the Bank of England.

The other girl, Caroline Hamilton, is the daughter of a director of a large departmental store in London.

The girls are taught their lessons—reading, writing, arithmetic, geography, history and nature study—by Katharine Peebles, the royal governess, in a schoolroom overlooking the palace gardens.

### Pakistan Girls Always Get A Husband

MONTREAL (CP)—The women of Pakistan enjoy political rights equal to those of western women, but their husbands are still chosen for them by their parents.

"Both the parents and children like this arrangement," says Begum Mammoona Ali Khan Mohammedi, a real estate and editor of the English-language daily, The Eastern Examiner, of Chittagong, East Pakistan.

The begum recalled that although they are cousins, she and her husband did not meet until their marriage.

"In my country we have few divorces because practically all marriages are very happy.

"The fact that husband and wife don't know very much about each other before marriage, means they both make a real effort towards marriage," added the begum, mother of two daughters, 21 and 15.

She is on a four-month tour of Canada and the United States, sponsored by the department of external affairs and the U.S. state department.

The begum said Pakistani women "always get a husband." She and her husband—he's a businessman in East Pakistan—are looking for a husband for their eldest daughter, "but there is no hurry."

Her daughter is studying medicine and is "much too busy to think about marriage." She sometimes goes to the movies with girl friends and occasionally attends social functions with her parents but, "of course she doesn't go out with boys and never goes to night clubs."

Boys and girls in Pakistan go to the same classes but girls don't mingle with boys after school hours.

"And believe me, our girls are happy to leave the matter of choosing a husband to their parents, who know better and can be relied on to choose well."

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### FAMINE IN CHINA

TOKYO (AP)—The Red China radio reports 15,000,000 Chinese are suffering from famine in the Hopei province of north China. The broadcast heard here said that 1,775,000 tons of relief supplies and food are being sent.
