

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, July 11. The News says it is reasonably anticipated that Friday will see the Land Bill out of the Committee of the Commons.

The police have raised a box of revolvers at Castleroa, County Roscommon.

Passengers of the steamer Vandalia, having expressed a desire to stick to the Vandalia and her officers, they will remain and sail in her for New York when the vessel has been repaired.

NEWS FROM EUROPE.

MARSEILLES, July 11.

The Mediterranean squadron of ten large vessels has left Toulon for Stax and Tunis.

Paris, July 11.

An American sailor named Mills was killed in a scuffle with an English sailor at Havre. Five persons have been arrested.

ATHENS, July 11.

The reported evacuation of Tunis is officially denied. The evacuation will take place in three months according to treaty.

LONDON, July 11.

The News correspondent at Giurgievo, after describing the terrorism exercised by Prince Alexander at the recent elections for members of the Assembly, states that even the Bulgarian newspapers published by the American Missionaries at Constanti-nople were prohibited from circulating.

UNITED STATES.

CITY OF MEXICO, July 11.

The roof of a church fell in at Sanmatta and fifty people were killed.

CINCINNATI, July 11.

The U. S. signal service thermometer registered 103.5-10 at 3 Sunday afternoon. Ordinary thermometers in the shade registered 7 to 8 degrees higher. The heat was the greatest on record here.

INDIANAPOLIS, July 11.

The thermometer on Sunday marked 101 in the shade. There were several sun-strokes, three fatal.

PITTSBURG, Pa., July 11.

The thermometer to-day reached 94 degrees, and caused 15 cases of prostration. Eleven deaths from sunstroke are reported to-day, making 21 deaths and 30 prostrations since Saturday.

WASHINGTON, July 11.

The official bulletin issued at 8 a. m. is as follows: The President passed a comfortable night, and his condition shows improvement over that of yesterday; pulse, 98; respiration, 22. Signed by his physicians.

CHICAGO, July 11.

At a meeting of the Socialist, Quaker and membership with the Socialists, declaring Socialism does not tend to the crime of assassination, that Guiteau's act grew out of the falsity of the present state of society, that the elevation of a citizen to such an exalted office as President is opposed to the principle of equality and empurts the interests of society by inviting desperate and reckless men to the crime of assassination, and that the Presidency and Senate should both be abolished.

NEW YORK, July 11.

It is reported that the Stalwarts intend nominating Ex-President Grant and Ex-Vice-President Wheeler for Senators.

MARSHALSTOWN, Iowa, July 11.

The rain of yesterday swelled the streams to such an extent that a large amount of damage was done to property. Forty houses were swept away, but so far as learned there was no loss of life.

EXECUTIVE MANSION, July 11-7 p. m.

The President has had rather more fever this afternoon. In other reports his condition is unchanged. Pulse, 108; temperature, 102.8; respiration, 24.

The sealing operations about Newfoundland have been very profitable the past season. Twenty-seven steamers and many sailing vessels were engaged, the steamers making two trips each to the ice floes, where the seals are taken during the season which lasted from March 15 to May 15.

Local and Other Items.

THE Tea Party held at Souris to day, notwithstanding the rain, was numerously attended, and it is expected that the proceeds will be very large.

THE Corbett property, situated on the corner of Pownall and Kent streets, was sold by auction by William Dodd at noon to-day, and was purchased by Mr. Henry Weeks for \$2050.

WE understand that the Rev. R. D. Bambrick will return, after the summer holidays, and resume his charge of St. Peter's School, and also his duties as Assistant Curate of St. Peter's Church.

THE total number of sheep in Kansas State this spring was 80,000. One flock which was sent from California to Montana by J. H. Wilder for breeding purposes, on 27th June last, consisted of 125,000.

THE case of Owen Connolly and another vs. George Howatt, an action on notes of hand, is now before the Supreme Court. The defence in the case is that the notes sued on were included in an agreement of settlement made between Mr. Howatt and the Merchants Bank of Halifax. The case will probably be finished to-morrow evening.

NUISANCES.—Two fines of twenty dollars each were imposed by the Stipendiary Magistrate this morning for filthy yards. A few more of such fines will compel cleanliness. In our opinion no fine is too heavy for such gross neglect, and the Magistrate having given every one due notice, is evidently determined to make these delinquents obey the laws, if not for their own, for their neighbors' sake.

The musical part of the programme was very well sustained by Mr. Chisholm and the following ladies and gentlemen belonging to Souris: Mrs. Mellett and Miss Fuller, and Messrs Strong and Morrison. The selection of songs and choruses sung was all that could be desired, the accompaniment to them being tastefully played by Miss Bessie Knight, which was one of the best of the evening.
