Fisheries Minister Leo Rossiter indicated that lobster landings during May in the province "were not as high as expected in most areas."

Giving the over-all picture for May, Mr. Rossiter said that 2,489,000 pounds were landed in May, 1960, which was a record year that yielded 10,100,000 pounds in both seasons, the landing was 4,362,000 pounds.

P.E.I. Handicraft Display Slated For Ch town, Sept.

The first step in boosting the manufacture and sale of island made handicrafts and souvenirs will take place next September with the staging of a "handicrafts Exhibition in Charlottetown, George Fraser, director of the P.E.I. Travel Bureau, revealed yesterday.

Assisting the tourist department in laying the plans for expansion of this potentially valuable industry is Dr. Ivan H. Crowell, director of handicrafts for the New Brunswick department of industry and development, who is now in the province.

These foreign made articles have been the cause of many tourists voicing complaints about not being able to obtain authentic local made souvenirs. Dr. Crowell pointed out that the average tourist looks forward to being able to return home with some authentic memento of his trip, and he is very displeased when he turns it over and discovers a label which reveals the article was made in a foreign country.

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Mr. Crowell suggested that at the time of the exhibition the operators of gift shops throughout the province, should be invited to attend, to view the handicrafts and be encouraged to place orders, some of which will be delivered by Christmas and others well in advance of the 1963 tourist season.

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Old Bear Story Investigated

I visited Belle River last week to probe the story of the bear that "Sandy Ronald" Stewart saw 60 years ago, and learned old Bruin had never been found by a hunt that was organized. Naturally I found some skepticism as to one had ever been seen, although Lizzie Macdonald's "The Hunter and the Bear" poem of February 1902 shows that Ronald was a man who knew bears, and should know one when he saw one.

Simon Stuart recalls a story it was Willie MacLaren's Newfoundland story that I heard in a "news" column, "The most monstrous animal, and the biggest dog I ever saw."

Sandy Ronald's grandson, Dr. Stewart MacDonald, D.V.M. here, revealed to me and I sensed that, understandably, he had enough faith in his father to feel that the bear had been there. I think some of the lines are particularly good, and I'm going to give you a few of them to show you what I mean. I hope, incidentally, that some of you will be kind enough to read them to any blind people in your home or community.

MOST INTERESTING thing to me, more than a half century later, was to find the colorful lines which caught the atmosphere, and the excitement, of the quiet country that had suddenly become filled with excitement at the unusual event, were penned by a blind girl, who caught the spirit of the event from what others told her and caught the atmosphere too with that unusual sensitivity which the sightless people so often develop.

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Deer Price Committee May Report Mid-July

P.E.I. beef cattle producers will probably be asked to meet here in mid-July to hear a report from their committee investigating the possibility of getting better prices for their animals if it was learned yesterday from J. Lincoln Dewar, secretary of the P.E.I. Federation of Agriculture.

The committee, under the chairmanship of Daniel Gass, Cornwall, was named at a province-wide meeting of pure bred and commercial cattle beef producers here April 19 to study marketing problems, and bring in detailed suggestions for improvement.
