A most unusual and highly interesting coloured film telling "The Story of Glass" was shown by Thomas Taylor of the Pilkington Glass Co. The story was filmed at the huge factory operated by the firm in England and showed every conceivable use of the finished product from dainty house curtains to apartment building blocks.

In a brief introduction, to the film Mr. Taylor referred to the accidental discovery of the glass process by Arab tribesmen 3,000 years ago when a camp fire fused the sand and aroused interest.

"Today 22 per cent of our activities bring us into contact with glass in some form or other," Mr. Taylor said. "Glass is one of Britain's largest items of export, with a vast demand in all parts of the world."

NEW YORK (AP)—Hanukkah, the Jewish festival of lights, began at sundown Saturday. It is an eight-day holiday. Hanukkah, which means dedication, marks the victory more than 2,000 years ago of the ancient Jews over a much larger army led by the Syrian King Antiochus IV.

World Famous Choir Boys Have Astonishing Artistry

They may have resembled Christmas card chorists but they were in reality delightful flesh and blood little boys, these members of the Vienna Boys Choir who sang last evening at the Prince of Wales College auditorium in the second of the Community Concert Association series.

Twenty-two of them, age eight to fourteen, pink-cheeked and in sailor suits, with a generous sprinkling of towheads sang under the direction of their musical director, Gerhard Lang.

World famous is the Vienna Boys Choir since its founding in 1498, six years after Columbus discovered America. Haydn and Schubert were members until their voices changed. Performing only for the Austrian Imperial Court until the end of the Empire in 1918 the historic Seminary School, which trains the boys found it necessary to fall back on itself for support at the end of World War I and public concerts were inaugurated in 1926. This finely trained group has been visiting the U.S. off and on since 1932.

DISBANDED DURING WAR
The choir was disbanded during World War II, when the late Father Josef Schmitt, rector of the group, refused to allow the choir to be used for Nazi propaganda. With the end of hostilities, the choir was recognized and returned to the U. S. in 1948.

The concert, divided into three parts, opened with a group of sacred songs written in the 16th and 17th centuries.

These "A capella" (as in a chapel or church) songs were sensitively sung by these expert singers. There was great purity and sweetness of tone. The opening number "Zion, Hear the Sentinels Sing" was by Buxtehude an organist and composer. He instituted the Abendmusiken (evening music sacred concerto) held in church during Advent each year. J. S. Bach walked fifty miles to hear Buxtehude's music and was greatly influenced by him. This Buxtehude opening by a composer connected with Advent music was a particularly suitable one for program building at this Holy Season of the year.

THE SILLY GIRLS
After a brief intermission some of the lads changed from sailor suits to high-heeled shoes, dresses and wigs for their operetta, "The Silly Girls." The operetta is from a play by Moliere (1622-73) whose style of course was of great elegance. The play was adapted by Ilka Peters. The music used that of Strauss arranged by Helmuth Froschauer, choir master at St. Stephen's Cathedral, Vienna. (The church with the finest of Gothic spires). The operetta from a light Moliere story was an interesting and popular part of the program in that story written three centuries ago was used by later musicians with such successful results. The acting of the boys was excellent in timing and miming.

The third group in addition to Mozart, Schubert, Mendelssohn-
