JOHN A. MOORE, of the Bank of Nova Scotia is spending his holidays in the city. He is accompanied by his wife and family.

THE barque "George Peabody" arrived at Yarmouth last week, having been absent since she was launched in 1867, sixteen years.

THE marine slip at Pictou has had a profitable season thus far this year. About sixty-five hands have been constantly employed.

A BRICK of gold, valued at \$2,300, was taken from the Tangier Mines, Nova Scotia, last week. Good reports come from many of the gold mines.

AN inventor at Washington is said to be preparing a flying machine which he proposes to attach to his person while he swims over Niagara Falls.

IS Saturday's issue of the Transcript, the editor of that paper denies that he has been given the position of chief editor of the St. John Telegraph.

A NOTORIOUS young vagrant named Andy Brown was the only prisoner at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon. He was properly disposed of.

BREAKERS of the Scott Act in Moncton are being rigidly prosecuted. It is said that there are seven complaints entered and will be disposed of as soon as possible.

THE municipality of Vienna have passed a resolution appropriating four thousand florins to the fund for the relief of sufferers by the earthquake on the Island of Ischia.

THE shareholders of the bank of Nova Scotia have been notified to meet on the 8th instant to ratify the terms of the Union with the Union Bank of Prince Edward Island.

ON Sunday, Leeman, son of Joseph Barry, of Nappan, N. S., was drowned while bathing in the Nappan river. His body was found late in the afternoon four miles further down the river.

BRIG. "ZARA," McMahon, master, sailed for Liverpool, G. B., on the 7th instant, with a cargo consisting of 9,400 pieces deals and clogs, containing 242,000 feet, superficial measurement, shipped by the owners, Peake Bros. & Co.

MR. GLADSTONE, at the Wesleyan Conference, recently presented a number of blue ribbons in the presence of ministers. He expressed his gratification at the spread of the temperance movement in England, which pointed to a more hopeful future for the workingmen.

THE meeting of the Shareholders of the Union Bank has been postponed until the 16th of September, on account of the absence of the Cashier and two of the Directors, who are now in Halifax on business for the Bank.

THE Halifax Chronicle says that flour is unusually cheap at present, yet there is no decrease whatever in the price of bread, which remains at the same figure per loaf as when the staple was two dollars per barrel dearer, and householders are very generally remarking the fact.

A DESPERATE prize fight for \$500 was fought near Nanticoke recently. The principals were Paddy O'Brien, a saloon keeper, and Mike Breese, a miner. The men entered the ring according to the rules of the Marquis of Queensbury. Eleven rounds were fought, when a crowd of women broke into the ring, brandishing knives and pistols, and put a stop to the fight. Both of the pugilists were badly punished.

THE St. Patrick's Bazaar at Halifax is progressing favorably. Large donations headed by distinguished personages continue to pour in as will be seen from the Halifax Chronicle's list. Mrs. Inglis gratefully acknowledges the following donations in aid of St. Patrick's bazaar: Lieut-Governor Richey, \$2; Hon. A. G. Jones, \$5; Thos. O'Malley, \$20; also five suits boys' clothing from Messrs. Clayton & Sons.

A FAMILY named Hicks, residing in Charleston, Ill., became demented a short time ago. Those most effected were the father and the mother, a 15-year-old daughter and a 12-year-old son. They were about to crucify one of their children on a cross which they had previously made, when neighbors interfered. They are now under lock and key at the jail here, awaiting legal process to be sent to an asylum.

THE market to-day was largely attended and abundantly stocked. Butter had an upward tendency, selling at from twenty to twenty-five cents per pound; eggs were also on the rise, and sold at from fifteen to seventeen cents; common cheese sold at five to six cents per pound; while new milk cheese brought from fifteen to sixteen cents; new potatoes were scarce, they sold at from fifteen to sixteen cents per peck.

**Socialism in Italy.**  
ROME, Aug. 7.  
The police broke up a Socialist meeting at Ravenna yesterday.

**Death of British Soldiers.**  
LONDON, Aug. 7.  
The cholera has carried off one hundred and ten British soldiers in Egypt.

**A \$150,000 Fire.**  
LAWRENCE, MASS., Aug. 7.  
A fire this afternoon destroyed the mill of Wright & Braid. The loss is \$150,000.

**The Ischia Disaster.**  
MADRID, Aug. 7.  
The municipal authorities have voted 2,000 pesetas to the sufferers by the earthquake on the Island of Ischia.

**The Watertown Murder.**  
BOSTON, Aug. 7.  
Roger Amereau, charged with the murder of Mrs. Carleton, of Watertown, arrived here this afternoon in charge of Detective Wiggins.

**The Ring.**  
NEW YORK, Aug. 7.  
The long-expected boxing match between Sullivan and Slade came off yesterday evening. The Maori was knocked out in the third round.

**A Conspirator Sentenced.**  
LONDON, Aug. 7.  
M. Krazouski, once a Polish Author, has been convicted of being connected with a conspiracy and sentenced to two years imprisonment.

**A Heavy Bank Failure.**  
ST. ALBAINS, Vt., Aug. 7.  
The Vermont National Bank of St. Albains, Hon. Bradley Barlow, President, closed the doors this morning causing great consternation among depositors. Barlow is also President and owner of the South Eastern Railway of Canada.

**The Cholera.**  
LONDON, Aug. 7.  
In the House of Commons this afternoon Mr. Gladstone stated that the cholera had greatly delayed every plan, and that the early withdrawal of the British troops from that country is not likely, as a stable Government must be established in Egypt before they are re-called.

**Republicanism in Spain.**  
MADRID, Aug. 7.  
The troops in the fortress of Badajoz, of the Portuguese frontier, having deposed their commander, took possession of the city, shut the gates of the fort, and declared in favor of a Republic. They demand a constitution similar to that of 1869, and proclaim Zorilla for President. The King has sent troops to suppress the revolt, and a state of siege has been proclaimed.

**Bradlaugh's Demonstration.**  
LONDON, Aug. 7.  
Thirty thousand people attended the Bradlaugh demonstration at Trafalgar Square, and protested strongly against his exclusion from Parliament.

**Another Account.**  
LONDON, Aug. 7.  
A great demonstration took place to-day in Trafalgar Square, the object of which was to protest against the exclusion of Bradlaugh from the House of Commons. There were 30,000 persons present. The meeting passed a resolution favoring resistance by Bradlaugh of the mandate of the House of Commons. Copies of the resolutions were forwarded to the Queen, Gladstone, and to the Speaker of the House.

**HOME FROM WIMBLEDON.**—Trooper Geo. Langstroth, one of New Brunswick's contingent to Wimbledon, arrived home on Saturday, having come by the Polynesian to Rimouski, thence to his home. Among the others who came by the same steamer were Lieut. H. C. Chamberlain, Lieut. H. Smith, Lieut. P. Dillon, Sergt. R. P. Doyle, Sergt. F. Kennedy, Sergt. D. Smith and Corp. J. G. Gourie. The winners of the teams this year were about equal to those of former years, though the weather at one stage was very bad for shooting. But the team made a better stand than last year.

**NEW CUNARDERS.**—The Cunard Steamship Company have contracted with John Elder & Co., of Glasgow, for the building of two steamers on a scale, which, it is said, will be in advance of anything that has yet been devised for the Atlantic service. The ships are to be of 8,000 tons burden each and of 13,000 horse power. The sum invested constitutes the contract the largest that has ever been made in the ship owning and shipbuilding world. The price is in excess of \$260,000 for each, and it is designed that the two vessels shall make a speed of nineteen knots per hour, or to cross the Atlantic in less than six days.
