Their course had been taking them east in an attempt to float to Europe. ### Acadia Professor Addresses East Prince Ministerial Ass'n

On Tuesday, June 19, the East Prince Ministerial Association met in the hall of the Bedeque United Church. The day long meeting was in the nature of a retreat for ministers while the evening session was a public service. This was the first gathering of the kind held by the association and proved to be highly successful and rewarding.

Clergy in attendance were the Rev. E.H. Bean, L.D. Archer, Keith Hobson, L.M. Murray, G.A. Cowper-Smith, C.D. Matheson, Donald MacKay, C.A. Britten, E. Barass, Alex MacKay, J.K. Campbell, J.W. Howe, W.O. Weale, R.H. Baxter, George Somers and S.H. Haslam.

Under the chairmanship of the Rev. E.H. Bean the visiting lecturer was introduced. He was Rev. F.S. Fitzsimmonds, B.A., B.D.M. Th., Professor of Biblical literature at Acadia University. In the morning Mr. Fitzsimmonds gave a thought provoking study on "The Sacraments in Worship". "All of life should be a sacrament, he said. The sacraments bring us back to that ideal in that they are acts of witness to one's union with Christ and one's loyalty to Christ. The sacrament is an outward thing, a confirmation of the inward reality."

The theme of the afternoon session was "The place of the Holy Spirit in the life of the Church." "We try to live back in the time of Jesus," he said, "but in truth it is the Holy Spirit that makes manifest the life and work of Jesus in our midst." There were four things that the disciples found through the coming of the Holy Spirit a new courage, a new fellowship, a new power and a new character. The fruits of the spirit are the virtues of Christ."

The evening service of worship was led by the president Rev. E.H. Bean with the lesson being read by Rev. R.A. Baxter who also offered prayer. The Bedeque United Church choir sang the anthem "Bless thou the Lord, O my soul." Taking his text from Exodus 23: 27-31, Prof. Fitzsimmonds pointed out that the ultimate goal and purpose of man's redemption is to bring him into conformity with the image of God's Son. God drives out the enemy from within man but man also cooperates. No progress can be made in Christian life unless man makes the effort, but

Another company official said the company "knows nothing about any such deal." Massey-Harris-Ferguson has been mentioned among firms thought to be responsible for purchase of £1,000,000 worth of Standard ordinary stock during the last five months.
