News Notes.

The Government of Newfoundland pays over two hundred thousand dollars a year for "relief of the poor" and less than one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for education.

After fifteen years of wedded bliss a Georgia couple have produced 32 living witnesses of their fidelity to the Scriptural injunction to increase and multiply.

A Kansas farmer sent his boy to the pasture for the cows one evening last week, and the lad found that ten of them had been struck by lightning and were lying dead in the pasture.

Kem Kow is the queer title of a chemical compound that is being used on many railroads and in many factories as a coal saver. The claim is that it largely reduces the amount of smoke, and enables the engineers to use inferior coal.

The will of Mrs. David Bell, of Glasgow, Scotland, has just been recorded. It provides for the distribution of an estate valued at \$315,965. After leaving \$25,000 to relatives and local charities, the testatrix gives the residue to Gen. Booth "for the precious work for our blessed Lord which he is doing through the Salvation Army."

The report on education to the Presbyterian Synod draws attention to the fact that some 50,000 children of school age in Quebec did not last year attend any place of public or private instruction. This is almost 25 per cent. of the enrollment of pupils in all classes of schools in the Province.

Which?—A beautiful young lady and her once beautiful mother were walking down the street together when they met two gentlemen whom the mother knew. "How much your daughter resembles you," exclaimed one. "How closely you resemble your daughter," exclaimed the other. Now, which of these gentlemen was invited home to tea?

An icicle fully 20 feet in thickness and 1,000 feet in length is said to have formed over a steep incline of rock on a mountain near Lunas city, Wash., the past winter. Recently the warmth of the sun loosened the icy mass and it went thundering down the mountain side, carrying everything before it, even trees three feet in diameter.

A writer in the Gentleman's Magazine, describing the sugar plantation in the Barbadoes, says that very little of the sugar goes to England, but is bought up for the American market, the planters preferring to sell to the Americans, because payment is made at once. The sugar sent to England passes through so many hands that the freight and commissions eat up all the profits.

In Holland and Germany experiments have been made with peat which reveal a possibility that peat bogs, wherever located, may become mines of wealth. This vegetable fibre has been utilized for a myriad of purposes, including cloth for suitings, blankets, rugs, quilts and other articles for which wool is now used. Naturally, this matter attracts much attention in Ireland, which has 3,000,000 acres of peat bog.

The Itata, the Chilean insurgent vessel that gave the United States officials the slip at San Diego, will probably be joined on her southern way by the armored cruiser Esmeralda, and if overhauled by the speedy Charleston a sea fight in Mexican waters is highly probable. The Esmeralda is rather the superior of the Charleston in weight of guns, and her consort, the Itata, has mounted four guns.

The great success of Mr. Auchmuty's manual training institute in New York, and Mr. Pratt's in Brooklyn, is stirring up the friends of education in other cities, and soon the industrial school will be the universal adjunct of the academic school. As Rev. E. E. Hale says in by the medieval notion that there is some magic in the art of reading and that all knowledge which is of worth is to be acquired by the use of letters." The time has come for the public to move in this matter of educating the hands as well as the brains of the children who are most of them to make their living by their work.

The report of the statistician of the United States Department of agriculture, now in press, shows an increase since April of last year of more than 100 per cent. in the price of corn and oats, 49 per cent. in the price of wheat in primitive markets, 32 per cent. in Chicago for choice beef's and 34 for Texas and advanced values of all cereals and meats. A hopeful and cheerful feeling is noticed, says the report in official correspondence from all parts of the country. The elimination of the surplus of corn and oats through the under-production of last year, ensures good prices for those crops, and the shortage of the wheat for two years, with the low foreign prospect for the growing crop, promises the largest demand for five years at remunerative prices. Fortunately present appearances indicate ability to meet such demand with ease.

The English census returns are showing the tendency of the time to leave the agricultural districts and flock into the cities and towns. In Northamptonshire there has been an average reduction of 20 per cent. in the population of the agricultural districts, and an increase in the manufacturing districts of from 30 to 50 per cent. Several of the larger villages have more than doubled. All the villages and small towns in South Lincolnshire show reduced populations as compared with 1881. Boston, however, keeps up, having been 13,330 in 1881, and 18,329 now. The agricultural districts in Norfolk also show decreases.

According to a synopsis of the will of Mr. Patrick Parcell, published in the Cornwall Freeholder, he bequeathed to church and charitable institutions about \$30,000, including \$10,000 to the Bishop of Alexandria for the benefit of the poor of all denominations and for the education of promising young men of the county. There is a provision of the will empowering his executors to forgive any debts and to discharge any mortgages gratuitously in poor circumstances, especially when the parties concerned are widows and orphans. The forgiveness of a debt is an excellent piece of beneficence and one which does not come to late when it takes effect upon the death of the creator.
