BRITAIN MAY DENOUNCE PACT WITH JAPAN

PLANS ACTION IN BLOCKADE AT TIENTSIN

Economic Reprisals May Be Taken In Grave Far Eastern Situation

SANDERSON, Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONDON, June 15.—(CP Cable)—The British Government is considering denunciation of the 1911 Anglo-Japanese Treaty as a prelude to the launching of a series of economic reprisals against Japan for the Tientsin blockade and the British Concession in Tientsin.
