Physical Fitness urged By Speaker At Rotary

Harry Hodge, M.F., Ph.D., chief physio-therapist on the staff of the Provincial Rehabilitation Centre, was guest speaker at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Rotary Club at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday. Dr. Todor Genchov was chairman and T. D. DeBello vice-chairman.

"To enjoy a good life, one needs good health," the speaker said. "This must not be misconstrued with physical fitness — this is within the doctor's province."

Describing his quest for physical fitness, beginning at the age of 12, which eventually brought him to the Regent Street Polytechnic where "cross country" was the order of the day, Mr. Hodge said, "In a short time I was told by A. G. Hill, Olympic 100 and 200 metres champion, 'You're not fit for cross country, you're a track man, report at the gym next week.'"

Maxims can play a great part in physical fitness, the speaker said, as he quoted, "Sow a thought and reap an action, sow an action and reap a habit, sow a habit and reap a character you are known." "There are two basic things that really must be observed," Mr. Hodge said. "The spacing of your daily life — eight hours work, eight hours play and eight hours sleep, is a fine way to live 24 hours a day."
