THE PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY.

Summary of the Business Transacted

HALIFAX, N. S., June 14.—The Presbyterian General Assembly resumed this morning. The most interesting business in the forenoon was the presentation of the report on statistics. From the Atlantic to the Pacific the pastoral charges and mission stations number 2,942, church meetings, 575,931, an increase of 12,575. Families in pastoral charges, 109,546; in mission stations, 3,695; total, 113,141. Communicants in pastoral charges, 205,602; in mission stations, 5,085; total, 210,775. Communicants received on profession of faith, 10,118—660 less than last year. This item is regarded as calling for serious consideration. Removals by discipline, 94—eleven less than last year, which he regarded as very gratifying. Baptisms, 11,646—an increase of 336. Attendance at Sabbath school, 160,105, an increase of 1,608. There was a decrease of 3,765 in the memberships of the young people's societies.

The total revenue of the church amounted to \$2,384,897, an increase of \$114,241.

In the afternoon the Presbyterian colleges were reported for, each presenting an encouraging statement.

A delegation was received from the Anglican synod, conveying kindly greetings and bearing the following resolution:

"The Diocesan synod of Nova Scotia, in session assembled, this morning passed the following resolution:

"That the synod of this diocese desires to convey its greetings to the Presbyterian General Assembly, now in session in Halifax, and to express the hope that its deliberations may be blessed to the glory of God and the building up of His kingdom on earth."

Principal Caven, Principal Grant, Rev. Dr. Sedgwick and George Mitchell, M. P. P., were appointed a committee to return the visit of the deputation from the Diocesan synod and convey the Christian greetings of the assembly to that court of the Church of England.

The evening was taken up with home missions. The financial condition of the fund was never better in the history of the church. Rev. Mr. Pringle, missionary to the Yukon, made a thrilling address.

THE PROTECTION OF TROUT STREAMS.

It is a crying shame that one of the greatest attractions our province possesses for the tourist should be destroyed by unlawful means right under the very eyes of its *soi de sant* protectors. The vicinity of Tignish, as you are probably aware, has many of the finest trout streams in the whole Island, and there is not one of them but where netting is carried on by wholesale. A few years ago wheranglers could be almost sure of a catch at any time in the proper seasons streams are now whirled in vain, and in most of them a net is stretched across the main channel at its bridges. So notorious is this practice become that no effort is made to cover up their tracks on the part of the perpetrators. The claim is made by those people that they have the same right to the trout as the white-collared gentlemen of leisure. You can entice them with the fly. I may tell you, sir, that I am not a follower of Issak Walton, but ask you, in the interest of the community, to wake up the powers that be.

WHEAT DAMAGED.—The C. P. R. crop report, issued on June 2th, indicates some damage to wheat in Manitoba and adds: "If we have good heavy rains during the next two or three weeks, it is hoped that crops will be good average ones. In the territories there appears to have been an ample rainfall."

ROCKY POINT EXCURSIONS.—The excursions between Charlottetown and Rocky Point by the steamer Elia have only to become better known to be more highly appreciated. The sail is a delightful one, and Captain Wisener does everything in his power to add to its pleasure. As will be seen by the time-table published elsewhere in THE EXAMINER the steamer makes a good many trips between these points during the day.

THE DUST NUISANCE.—The dust nuisance continues unabated in Charlottetown. The driver of our one watering cart sits listlessly on his perch and drives up and down Queen Street. Occasionally he makes an excursion in some other direction, but Queen Street seems to be the favorite promenade. In the meantime the dust plays "high jinks" on Queen Square, a state of affairs that could be remedied in five minutes if the watering cart would go over it.

HOME WITH THE IRISH.—The Island rifle team that was at Halifax returned home last night,—this time with the trophy. They were met at the wharf by several officers of the militia and the Boys' Brigade of the Methodist Church, the latter as a guard of honor. More particulars have come of the shooting. The Islanders' average at 200 yards was 29, at 500 yards 31½ and at 600 yards 29½. At the 500 yards sergeant Major Baird, sergeant Moore and Major Crockett scored 35 the possible. At this range one of Sergeant Moore's sighting shots was a bull, and both Major Crockett's sighting shots were bulls. The highest score was 96, made by Gunner McCachern, 1st, C. A., Halifax. Sergeant Baird and Sergeant Morse, the latter of the 69th Battalion, N. S., made the second highest scores, 95. The weather was favorable; the light was good and the winds somewhat variable.
