

125th Anniversary North Bedeque Pastoral Charge

The 125th Anniversary of the North Bedeque Pastoral Charge was celebrated on Sunday, August 27, with special services in the morning and in the evening.

A history of the church was given by Rev. J. A. Jardine in which he traced the development over the 125 year period and divided the years into three main groups: From 1700 to 1825 when the church was served by a minister from outside points; 1825-1925, one hundred years as a congregation of the Presbyterian Church; and the third from 1925 to 1950 as the United Church.

The inspiring morning message was based on the text in Proverbs 29:18: "Where there is no vision, the people perish".

In the evening a short memorial service was held "In memory of those who had gone before" during which time the choir sang the Anthem, "For all the Saints who from their labours rest".

Canadian Plane To Be Tested

OTTAWA, Aug. 31—(CP)—Canada is sending two planes to the United States to take part in an experiment aimed at producing the best possible training plane for itself, the U. S. and Britain.

It was announced that two Chipmunk training aircraft— they are the successors to the little Tiger Moth—will take part in a joint U. S. navy-air force primary training plane evaluation program.

The two Chipmunks, designed and built in Toronto by De Havilland Aircraft of Canada, will perform in tests scheduled to begin at Randolph Air Force Base, San Antonio, Texas, Sept. 20.

The evaluation program is regarded by air force officials in the three countries as a step towards future standardization in the training of student pilots on aircraft with similar characteristics. It is designed to develop ideal specifications for a standard primary trainer, and it is not expected that a production contract will be awarded to any of the manufacturers represented. Once the ideal specifications have been determined, they will be made available to the three nations concerned, in order that each may develop the best primary trainer for its own use.
