C. N. R. Employee Passes On

—One of the oldest employees of the Atlantic Region of the Canadian National Railways, Thomas Dow Gay, formerly of O'Leary, died at his home in Sussex on March 28 after a lengthy period of falling health.

Mr. Gay retired from the C.N.R. service in 1933 after being in the railway's employ for 40 years and just a few months ago was the pleased recipient of an emblem and a rolled gold embossed plate signifying a half century of membership in the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen. Due to impaired health at the time he was unable to go to Moncton to be presented with the emblem and the plate, at the ceremony which was held at Atlantic Region headquarters for fellow recipients.

Mr. Gay was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Gay and resided for a time at Hampton, N. B., later going to Sussex about 20 years ago. His final period of railway service was spent on the Sussex-Saint John run. He was admitted to membership in the Brotherhood on November 22, 1903. In Sussex his chief interests were his home, his garden and his enjoyment of the firm friendships he formed.

Mr. Gay leaves to mourn, his wife, Miss Alice Gay, Sussex; two brothers, Howard Gay of Moncton and Leonard Gay (formerly of Summerside) and now of Moncton; and one sister, Mrs. A. Rideout of Boston.

The funeral was held from his home on Sunday, March 28 when service was conducted by Rev. J. M. Armstrong, pastor of the United Baptist Church.

The hymn "Nearer My God To Thee" was sung and H. W. Wallace sang as a solo "Some Day We'll Understand". About 35 of the members of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen from Moncton attended and conducted a service in the Kirk Hill cemetery.

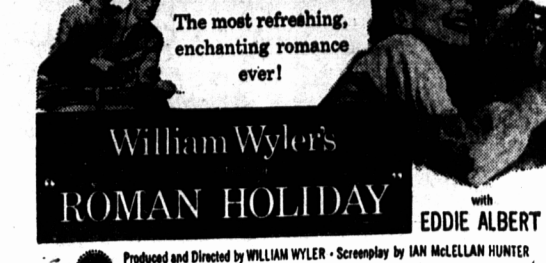
