Charles Signs To Fight Lee Oma On Jan. 12

NEW YORK, Dec. 12 — (AP) — Heavyweight champion Ezzard Charles today signed to meet Lee Oma of Buffalo in a 15-round title fight in Madison Square Garden, Jan. 12. It will be the sixth title defence for the Cincinnati Cobra. Charles will receive 40 per cent of the gate and Oma 17 1/2. If Oma should win the crown, the two will meet in a return bout within 90 days.

Chandler To Retire Next May

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Dec. 12 — (AP) — Commissioner A. R. Chandler tonight announced his intention to retire May 1, 1951. At a secret joint meeting of major leagues today three ballots failed to give Chandler a new contract. Twelve of the 16 club owners must agree to a new contract before Chandler could stay on. He has held the job since April 24, 1945. On the first ballot the vote was 9-7 for renewal; the second was 8-8 and the third was 9-7.

Louis Declines Suggestion That He Quit Boxing

BELLE RIVER, Ont., Dec. 12 — (AP) — In his usual, quiet manner, Joe Louis replied today to John (Ox) Da Grosa who wants the former champion barred from further fights "in the best interests of boxing" and Louis himself. "I wouldn't raise a fuss if any state barred me for failing to measure up to its rules and regulations and physical requirements," said Louis at his training camp here. "That's what they've all got doctors for—to see if you're all right."

"I plan to get back in condition and take on each opponent as he comes up. That's what I'm taking on (Freddie) Beshore for — to see if I can't get back to where I used to be as a fighter." Da Grosa, Pennsylvania Athletic Commissioner, said in Philadelphia Sunday night that he has started a move to keep the 36-year-old Louis out of the ring in Pennsylvania and will ask the United States National Boxing Association to do likewise. He said that Louis' fight with Beshore in Detroit Jan. 3 should be called off for the "health, welfare and future" of the slowed-up Brown Bomber and that permanent retirement of Louis would be "in the best interests of boxing."

In New York, Marshall Miles, manager of Louis, and the International Boxing Club, in a statement by president James D. Norris, declared jointly: "Louis is fighting because he wants to fight. No pressure from any source has been exerted to force him back into the ring. He feels that the ring is his business and that is where he can make a living as he has in the past." Asked about another meeting with heavyweight champion Ezzard Charles, Louis said, "I'm not thinking about Charles or any other fighter but Beshore right now."

Durelle Wins In 10-Round Decision

YARMOUTH, N.S., Dec. 11—(CP) — Middleweight Yvon Durelle of Bale St. Anne, N. B., punched his way to a startling 10-round decision over the Canadian light heavyweight champion, Tiger Warrington, in a non-title boxing bout Saturday. Warrington was slow and off-form, and the younger Durelle scored consistently with head and body punches. A crowd of under 2,000 watched him get the unanimous nod in a dull match. The champ from Liverpool, N.S., weighing 173, boxed well in the early rounds but tired and was missing regularly in later rounds. Each fighter was downed once. Durelle taking a long count in the second after being floored by a low, glancing blow and Warrington briefly late in the match under a flurry of blows.

To Restrict Broadcasts

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Dec. 12—(AP) — Brooklyn Dodgers announced Saturday they will cooperate with the minor leagues and restrict their radio broadcasts to their "own territory." E. J. (Buzzy) Bavasi, Dodger vice-president, said the Dodgers will broadcast their games "only where it would do us some good." Last year the Brooklyn club broadcast over its own network into many sections of the United States. Widespread broadcasts of major league games in minor league territory have been blamed for much of the 19-per-cent attendance decrease in the minors in 1950.

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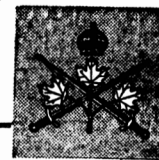
