HOUSTON (AP)—Philadelphia Phillies, Washington Senators and the commissioner of baseball all picked up power at the winter meetings of the major league clubs in Philadelphia last week.

Phil, excused from the World Series after blowing a 10-0 lead in the first game in September, were the most active club at the meetings. Besides trading for Stuart and Belinsky, they picked up pitcher Ray Herndon and first baseman Jeff Lina from Chicago White Sox for outfielder Danny Carter and shortstop Lou Piniella and first baseman E. Power.

Hockey Picks Geo. Chuvale To Knock Out Patterson

By Jerry Gladman — Toronto (CP) — Hockey Marciano, former undefeated heavyweight boxing champion, calls George Chuvale to knock out another former champion, Floyd Patterson, in three or four rounds when they meet in New York Jan. 21.

The Toronto fighter signed last Monday to meet Patterson of Scarborough, N.Y., to decide who will qualify for a crack at the championship, left vacant when the World Boxing Association striking Cassius Clay of the title for signed to meet ex-champion Sonny Liston in a return match.

There are those who might suggest prejudice overshadowing in Rocky's prediction—the former Brockton, Mass., boxer is an adviser in the Chuvale camp — but he presents strong arguments to back up his confidence.

Marciano would take three or four shots to get through one of his own hammer — like blows to body and head. His amazing ability to absorb all kinds of punishment and still retain his strength enabled him to outlast his strongest opponents.

HAS GRANITE JAW

SOUBIS — A successful boxer was knocked down only twice in a 48-bout career, has a granite jaw. The Toronto fighter has never been seriously hurt. Let alone knocked off his feet. In recent years it wasn't difficult to compare Chuvale with Marciano—George would take three or four punches to land one of his own.

However, it's a different story these days with Chuvale under new management — prominent Toronto business man, Irv Yerman, and associates—and a well-known veteran trainer in Theodore McWhorter.

The 210-pound boxer no longer stands flat-footed, his hands by his sides, leaving himself open for counter punches. He now keeps his hands high, employs a crisp left jab and throws many combinations He
