Bruce Stewart Co. Plant Humming With Activity

With 210 men working full time and most of them working over three nights each week from 6 to 10 p. m., the plant of Bruce Stewart and Co. Ltd., presents a scene of activity that is reminiscent of war contract days.

Superintendent A. W. Burns in speaking of the prospects for a continuance of this high pressure production period said: "We sincerely desire that every man in the plant will have work with us for the winter and with that end in view every avenue will be explored."

Among immediate activities is the construction of a new ram for the Wood Island ferry terminal which is nearing completion. When work on the structural steel production is finished at the plant, the parts, weighing 15 tons, will be taken to the ferry terminal and assembled by men from the plant. The present ram, which is of light steel construction, is about worn out and replacement is urgently needed.

Among the recently installed equipment at their wharf plant is a shaper lathe of the very latest pattern, electrically driven, and capable of processing larger material than has heretofore been possible. A portable air compressor has also been added which lends itself to quick jobs in any part of the establishment. In the foundry an order for 20 tons of iron castings has been just completed after working the crews to capacity for some time. This activity was in addition to brass casting, shipwork and general jobbing of all kinds.

Speaking of the work in progress on the two mine sweepers undergoing what is equivalent to an entire re-modelling, Mr. Burns said: "We are rather pleased with our work on the ships, because of the strict and constant Naval inspection we are able to meet, as well as the speed with which our operations are being carried out."

Two new buildings have been added to the plant to take care of the gradual expansion which the Company enjoys. A one story structure 25 by 40 feet now houses equipment for snagging castings, a grinding and tumbling mill and re-conditioning machinery.

The two story addition to the pattern and carpenter shop increases that area to 40 by 80 under one roof, part of which is now assigned to plumbing, temporarily, until further expansion can be undertaken.

Foundry Capacity Increased

The capacity of the foundry has been increased by the installation of a new crane with a lift of two tons and also a brass cupola for melting previous to moulding, which is heated by oil and coke. Commenting on the market for Imperial gasoline engines Mr. Burns said that the demand has been very heavy for the past two months. A start will be made in about a month to assemble en-
