Hockey Experts Puzzled Over Showing Of Chatham Maroons

CHATHAM (CP) — Hockey experts were scratching their heads Tuesday over Chatham Maroons—a Cinderella hockey squad that just didn't know when it was beaten.

Maroons, emerging Monday night as Ontario Senior A hockey champions probably were pretty puzzled themselves. Next they take on Saint John Beavers, Maritime champions, in a best-of-seven series for the eastern Canada championship final which is also the semi-final of the Allan Cup tournament. The first game is at Chatham on Thursday.

The Beavers, say the experts, will have to be eager to dampen the kind of spirit that sustained the "underdog" team thus far.

TOOK ON FORM

Maroons barely scraped into qualifying for the Ontario championship—finishing fourth in the OHA schedule—but then took on form that was far from dead-beat.

Left behind were such crack crews as Stratford Indians, Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen, defend-

ing Canadian champions and 1956 Canadian Olympic entry, and Sudbury Wolves, northern Ontario champions—25 points.

A best-of-seven series for the eastern Canada final and Allan Cup semi-final opens at Chatham Thursday.

Maroons downed Indians in seven games, the Dutchmen were ditched after four straight games, and the Wolves were whipped three to two with two games tied after overtime.

Forward Jimmy Connelly has set a torrid scoring pace. In 18 playoff games he has 14 goals and 11 assists—25 points.

Linemate Eric Unger, has 10 goals and 14 assists for the playoffs.

HELD IN CHECK

Lloyd Ferguson, the team's top sniper during the season with 40 goals, has been held in check for most of the playoff games and has scored only seven goals.

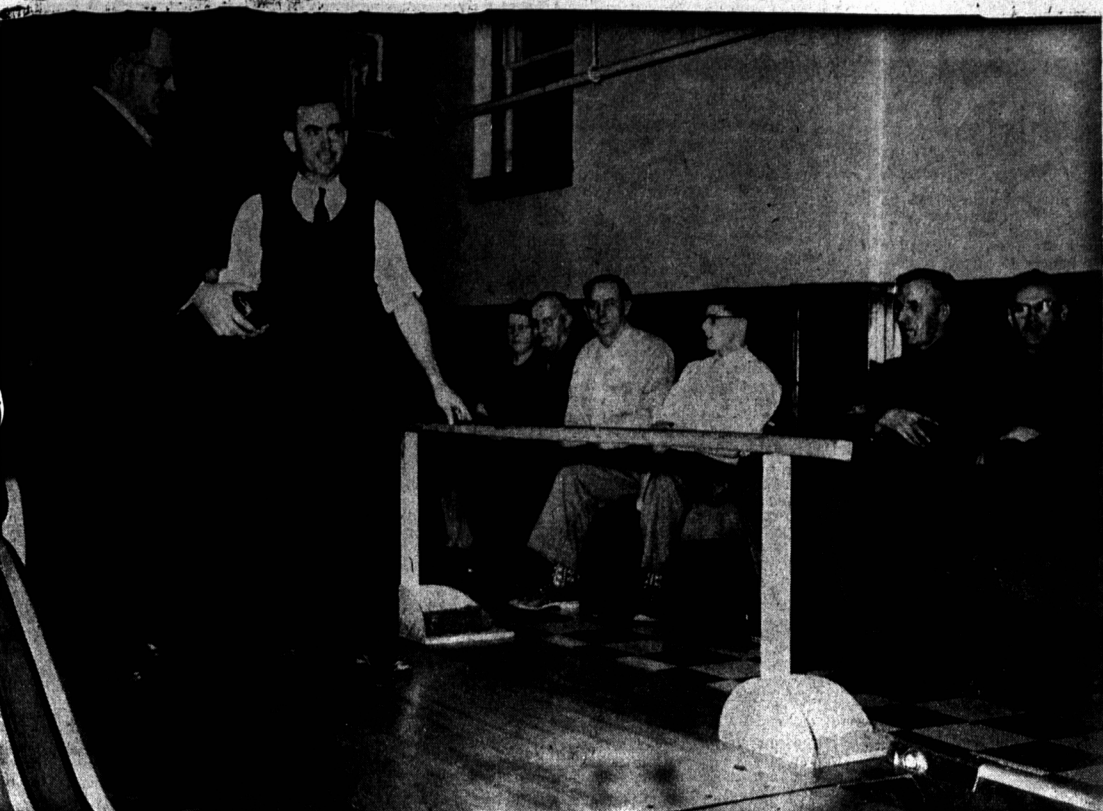

The matches will be played at the Colonial country club, Fort Worth, Texas, May 7 and 8 for the John Jay Hopkins Trophy.

The seven names announced by Bill Kerr, president of the Canadian PGA, are:

Kerr, Stan Leonard and Jack Kay, Montreal; Al Balding, Gordie Brydson and Murray Tucker, Toronto, and Bill Mawhinney, Vancouver.

Leonard, now playing on the pro circuit in the south, was formerly pro at the Vancouver Marine Drive club and now is attached to the Lachute club near Montreal.

The matches are sponsored by the International Golf Association, founded by Hopkins, American and Canadian industrialist, to promote international goodwill through golf.

Larsen Involved In Auto Crash

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP)—Don Larsen, whose pitching gave the New York Yankees a big boost in their drive to the American League pennant last season, apparently escaped injury Tuesday when he smashed his automobile into a utility pole.

Patrolman James Liddle said Larsen fell asleep at the wheel while driving his new convertible along a St. Petersburg south side thoroughfare and smashed into the metal pole at 5:30 a.m.

The pole was broken off at the base and Larsen's car was demolished but the 26-year-old fast ball pitcher said he was not hurt. Liddle charged Larsen in municipal court with failure to reduce speed to avoid an accident and with driving with a void (California) license.

Heavy Duty Paying Off For Jensen

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP) — Extra heavy duty in Grapefruit League exhibition games apparently is paying off for Boston Red Sox slugger Jackie Jensen.

The 29-year-old veteran, noted for early season batting slumps, seems to have found the range while participating in more pre-season games than any other player on the Boston roster.

In 12 trips to the plate in his last three games, Jensen has belted two homers, a pair of doubles and four singles. In that stretch he has driven in five runs and scored four times himself.

Despite his mediocre start last year, Jensen hit 26 homers and drove in 116 runs, tying Ray Boone of Detroit for the American League's RBI leadership.
