The committee in the name of the Division take this opportunity of extending their thanks to those who so kindly patronized them on the occasion, thereby assisting in a work of brotherly love and Christian sympathy.

Our farmers are beginning to be alive to the importance of securing the best kind of cows for dairy purposes, the best utensils, and the best information as to the best methods of making the best butter. To this end they are beginning to see that they must cooperate, and thus we hear of a "Dairyman's Association." By the way, a very important conference is to be held at Gloucester, England, on the 22nd, 23rd, and 24th inst. The object is to consider "the needs of dairy farming to meet the requirements of the future."

The members of St. Mary's young men's temperance and benevolent society, of Halifax, gave an "at home" to Archbishop O'Brien, on Friday evening, at their rooms, Hope Hall. There were about one hundred present, and His grace was received with applause on entering the room, accompanied by Monsignor Power. The rooms of the club are certainly the best furnished and most homelike of any possessed by a temperance society and speak volumes for the success which is attending it. They presented His Grace with an address, to which he pleasantly replied.

The schooner Gertrude E. Foster, just arrived at Gloucester, reports picking up on Barquebeau, May 4, a dory containing two dead fishermen, supposed to have belonged to a French fishing vessel of St. Peter's. They had been dead but a short time. Both were young men, apparently respectively 22 and 18 years. The dory contained two baskets, a cork shell and compass, with the name Roland Honoré, probably the name of one of the fishermen. They had starved to death, and the indications are that they had been eating raw fish. They were taken on board the Gertrude E. Foster and buried at sea with the customary ceremonies.

A., Fowey: "Monday, June 4th, 1883—In lat. 9 26 N., long. 36 30 W. Whoever finds this note, which I put inside of a bottle, please write to the following address, and let me know when and where you found it, and oblige the same—Captain John Graham, Murray Harbor (north) Prince Edward Island, Dominion of Canada. Wishing you (the bottle, I mean) a safe and a speedy passage to your port of destination."

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Local and Other Items.

A SYSTEM of electric lighting is being inaugurated in Halifax.

The City Small Debt Court was to-day adjourned until the first Wednesday in June.

BILLS due in May have been satisfactorily met at Winnipeg, showing that the business men of that city have touched bottom.

TWELVE thousand names have been signed to the petition to the Queen favoring the restoring of Baker Pasha to his position in the army.

THE pit-fall on Great George Street, to which THE EXAMINER called attention a few days ago, was filled up and planked over to-day. Good!

ALEXANDER MCKENZIE, aged eighty-five years, a native of Pictou Island, has returned to that place to end his days, after an absence of fifty-eight years.

THE steamer Heather Belle was unable to get into Crapaud harbor to-day. Capt. McLean reports the Straits west of St. Peter's Island packed with ice.

By the death of William Mutch, Esq., (Briekhouse) the Province loses one of its best and most successful farmers—one who was a good citizen and an honest man.

JOHN L. SULLIVAN has been on the road giving exhibitions for seven months. During that time he has knocked out twelve men, had a good time, and made over \$100,000.

We are glad to learn that our citizens are taking hold so enthusiastically of the Arbor movement. Several gentlemen have arranged to go to the country this week to select trees.

THE funeral of the late James Connell was conducted, yesterday, under the Free Masons of this city. Mr. Connell was one of the oldest Masons on the Island; and the funeral was largely attended.

THE steamer Princess of Wales attempted to make a passage to Pictou this morning, but was obliged to return on account of the ice. She made a second attempt at 2 o'clock, and has not yet returned.

MATRIN AMERO died at Donnett Settlement, Digby County, N. S., on the 12th inst., aged 100 years and two months, leaving 50 grand children, 200 great grandchildren, and 40 great great grandchildren.

THE bark Lucy Pope, Capt. Joseph McDonald, will be loaded with oats by Welsh & Owen at this port, instead of Alberton. Mr. Myrick left here to-day by special train and will send part of the oats—about 54,000 bushel—by special to this city.

SAYS the Montreal Gazette of the 12th: There is a very strong feeling in refined sugar under an active enquiry, and prices to-day advanced 1/2c. per lb., granulated being held firmly at 7 1/2c. for round lots, and at 7 3/4c. to 8c. for ordinary sized parcels.

THE following telegram has been received from the colonial office: "It is Her Majesty's wish that the celebration of her birthday should be deferred for one month at least. Her Majesty has been pleased to appoint the 28th June for the celebration in the United Kingdom."

WE are pleased to see the police are taking steps to prosecute citizens who allow their horses to run at large on the streets. A fine was imposed on one individual today, and similar offences will, we hope, be disposed of in like manner. Horses at large are dangerous to ladies and children.

FRANKLYN P. NORRIS, a barrister of Norfolk, N. H., died last week of starvation. He was temperate and industrious, so the despatch says, "but did not show much aptitude for his profession." He tried living on crackers and water and when found in convulsions on his sofa had beside him a few crackers and a glass of water.

A UNITED STATES paper remarks: last week furnished a good illustration of the independence of our dairy markets. The heavy failures in Wall street affected not only all kinds of securities, but wheat, corn, oats, and provisions also, in fact everything that is dealt in on a speculative basis. On the other hand, butter and cheese went on the even tenor of their way, unaffected by any other than the legitimate influences of supply and demand and quality.

THE Scott Act has at last been enforced in Dorchester, N. B., and the Post says, "the 'Devil's Half Acre,' for the first time in its history, has been brought into line with advanced temperance sentiment, and for sobriety would have gladdened the heart of Neal Dow himself. One prominent citizen of Dorchester seeking what he found not that evening, remarked 'by—d—this is the first time I could not raise a drink in Dorchester. If they only keep this up it will be worth \$1,000 a year to me!'"

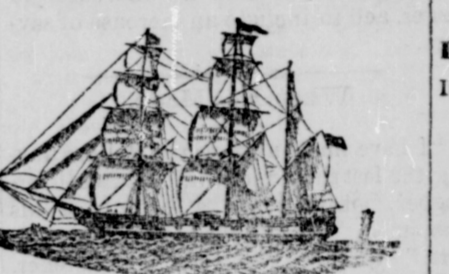
