Dear Mary Haworth: You frequently recommend psychiatric or analytic therapy and you make this recommendation without qualification.

Speaking as one who was more harmed than benefited by such treatment, I feel you owe it to your readers to give them a more realistic picture of the psychiatric or analytic procedure.

Does the average person know, for example, that treatment may take months, more likely years, and cost thousands of dollars in the latter event?

Do they know that psychology and analysis are still in the early experimental stages; that even now there is little scientific validation of the theories and techniques being used?

Do people know that the wrong techniques, unwisely applied by even well meaning professionals, can be dangerous?

Of course some persons are benefited. But some are not. And others, worse yet, are hurt by treatment. Shouldn't everyone be alerted to the possible risks involved?

Perhaps if the public were aware on this score, that very awareness would help to minimize the probability of errors.

Dear J.V.: You can't make a silk purse of a sow's ear," a proverb says. Psychiatry and analysis can't do more for the patient than his own potentials will permit.

Furthermore, no branch of medical practice guarantees 100 percent success with each and every client. A great many possibilities of unpredictable developments have a bearing on the result for better or for ill.

In my view, it is the medical time - an integral part of the doctor - patient relationship, to create a climate of candor, trust, and cooperation in the specific therapeutic undertaking. I refer to the correspondents to legitimate sources of help, I expect them to assume appropriate personal responsibility for their subsequent experience.

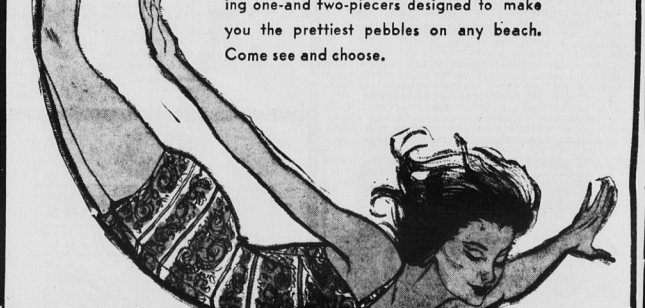
