Says Party Will Support Immediate Pay Increase

OSHAWA, Ont. (CP)—John Diefenbaker Wednesday night accused Prime Minister St. Laurent of injecting politics into the civil service.

As he wound up a fast-moving day in the Toronto-Oshawa area, the Progressive Conservative leader contended here that politics entered into Mr. St. Laurent's recent indication in a public speech that government employees would get a raise after election day.

Mr. Diefenbaker said his party would support pay increases immediately for the civil service and to institute them now instead of waiting until after the general election June 10.

"The time has come when the prime minister of Canada should not be primed to put the civil service into politics," the opposition chief said at a rally of about 1,000 persons that filled all seating space in Oshawa Collegiate auditorium.

"I call on the prime minister to act now so that Canada's civil service will not be plunged into politics by his actions in this campaign."

Premier Held At Workshop

CHARLOTTETOWN. The Prince Edward Island Premier of a new educational film illustrating the plays in Canada's development (May 31st) by The Canadian Chamber of Commerce in the Charlottetown Hotel. The showing was held during the Regional Board which is sponsored by the Canadian Chamber, the Maritime Board of Trade, with the cooperation of the Charlottetown Board of Trade.

Entitled "The Story of Creative Capital", the technicolor film was produced for the Canadian Chamber as part of its economic underpinning "action" program. The film is being distributed in Canada through the cooperation of the Canadian Chamber's 760 member Boards of Trade and Chamber of Commerce and 2,300 member companies. Other outlets include schools, service and social clubs, church, farm, civic, women and employee groups.

In colorful, humorous, light hearted animation, "The Story of Creative Capital" tells the exciting story of where capital comes from and what it does, with emphasis on the importance of the individual in Canada's economic system. It answers such questions as: Is everybody a capitalist?
