Lenten Meditations
DIFFERING GIFTS
(The London-Times)

The parable of the Talents emphasizes the important truth that a man is responsible for the use only of those gifts with which he has been endowed. Many fail to achieve anything at all commensurate with their innate capacities, either because they do not fully use, or entirely neglect to use their own gifts—perhaps envying the gifts of others, or because in seeking wider fields of action than those which lie in their own immediate situation, they miss the opportunities which are in front of them.

When a man is compelled to recognize that his gifts do not fit him for the more spectacular activities of life, he may give way to discouragement and think that what he can contribute to the common good is of little value. But in the divine scheme of things values are not always of necessity as men appraise them.

The simple ordinary life lived in a true spirit of service, inspired by the love of one's neighbor—"the single talent well employed"—may be ultimately as fruitful of good as the more obvious achievements which evoke men's admiration and gain their reward.

On the other hand, he who possesses capacities beyond the ordinary may think lightly of the humbler forms of service, and capitulate to the ever-present temptation of pride, forgetting that his talents are a gift for which he himself can claim no credit.

St. Paul speaks of the differing gifts with which men are endowed and says, in effect, cultivate your own gifts; they are God-given; they are not another man's, but uniquely your own; use them therefore to the utmost of your ability; they are a sacred trust, put into your hands by God.

And after enumerating certain specific "gifts" he goes on as he so often does, to speak of the spirit in which the Christian should order his life. For what always matters most is the quality of a man's life; it is that which alone raises his gifts and his activities to their highest level of spiritual potency.

In all this there is both a scourge of encouragement and a reason for humility. Humility is often characteristic of true greatness, and the example of our Lord shows that it is a true divine quality. "He humbled himself."

True humility does not demand the underrating of one's gifts, but it does enable a man to see them in their true perspective—as something given, and as involving a proportionate burden of responsibility. They may, indeed, add to his own life's enrichment, but they are primarily a trust for the enrichment of the lives of others.

where food and shelter might be procured.
Peter Fraser's diary, found in his pocket, tells the tragic story of how he and his companion spent their last hours in this world:
"January 29 returned to camp and killed the second dog. Ate part of it. We are both sick and badly frozen, with the skin peeling off our feet and hands. The cold is biting us to the marrow. Made a try for a settlement today but got hopelessly confused. No luck at all. Squires seems to be sinking fast. It don't seem as if I can last much longer. I just looked at my watch. Time 10 p.m. Squires has just passed away. His last words were: 'Give my money and clothes to my brother John.' I look at his cold, stiff body and think how lucky he is to be gone. Time 11:30 p.m. This is the end; all my belongings and property I leave to my dear mother."
Not until spring were the bodies of the lost hunters discovered. Side by side they lay, Squires and Fraser, snow for their winding sheet, a crude brush camp for their grave.
