HUGE CROWD SEES JANE AZOFF WIN FEATURE

Happy L. Paces Three Great Miles Winning 2:19 Trot And Pace

Calumet Emerald Winner Of Other Class—Winners Score Straight Heat Victories—Great Card Scheduled Today.

Having far too much "brush" for the field Jane Azoff 1:59 1-2, fast pacing mare owned by Mr. C. H. Horton of Murray River and capably driven by Willard Kelly yesterday chalked up a straight heat victory as she won the feature event of the Exhibition harness racing program, the big Free-For-All Trot and Pace as the third day of the four day program was again carried off without a hitch and once more was graced by brilliant sunshine that saw another capacity crowd that filled the grandstand and bleachers and flowed onto the side of the track.

Jane Azoff did not come near breaking the track record of 2:05 1-2 but she didn't need to. Her fastest mile was in 2:07 3-4 in the first heat as she thundered in from the 3-4 pole to win by a length but after that the beautiful pacing mare, the fastest ever brought to the Maritimes, was impossible to catch in the stretch as the rest of the field staged drives from the top of the stretch in.

Happy L Stars

But if the crowd failed to see Jane Azoff lower the track record they did witness Happy L, a pacing machine owned by Fred Robichaud of Stouffville, N. B., go through the 2:19 Trot & Pace in 2:08, 2:06 3-4 and 2:07 1-2 in winning the class. Trailing at the start of every heat the brown gelding just whizzed by his competitors when driver Bellevue called upon him and the time checked up in the three heats speaking volumes for the horse's ability.

On The Network

And for half an hour yesterday from 2:30 until 3 o'clock the program was heard all over Canada in a coast to coast network and also in part of the United States. Starting with the first heat the Free-For-All it was "Charlottetown" on the air and the huge throngs present must have been kept on their feet as they cheered madly as Jane Azoff came racing down the stretch at the end of the first heat and then kept on their feet afterwards as they witnessed bursts of sensational speed in every class on the cards.

FREE FOR ALL TROT & PACE

Iron Strong Factor

McSpaden, on a short course where his great iron play is a strong factor, put together a 32 and 31 for a 67 that left him 17 strokes ahead of Guidahl, the tournament favorite who ran home in 33; Hulbert, one of Canada's leading pros for several years, and another unknown who started the gallery with his fine rounds.
