THERE were seven large American schooners arrived in this city to-day, for cargoes of produce for the United States.

MR. WM. H. STEWART and bride returned home last evening, after a pleasant wedding tour through the Provinces and into the United States.

MR. GEORGE A. W. ROBERTSON has been appointed Assistant Clerk of the County Court at Charlottetown vice Mr. Hector McDonald, resigned.

THE Hon. Adam Crooks has entered an action against the Toronto Mail for libel—damages \$1,000. The Mail makes out a strong case against Mr. Crooks.

THE Rev. L. Desbrisay, late of St. Luke's Church, Montreal, but formerly of this Island, has received and accepted an invitation from the people of Christ Church, Belleville, to become their pastor.

PREPARING FOR THE HOLIDAYS.—We noticed yesterday the opening of a very large and excellent assortment of Fancy Goods and Toys at the "Diamond Bookstore," for the Christmas season.

THE first snow storm of the season passed over the city early this morning. It was accompanied by a violent wind. The streets of the city remained white during the early part of the day.

INFORMATION has been laid against a resident of Dorchester street for selling liquor without license. The informer, it appears, had been drinking in the house and had a row with the proprietor.

TO-DAY is the anniversary of the Battle of Inkerman. It is also the anniversary of the "Gunpowder Plot," by the notorious Guy Fawkes, in memory of which the Orange Hall of this city is decked with bunting.

A CASE of trespass was disposed of by T. Desbrisay, Esq., to-day. It was commenced by Mr. John McKinley against Mrs. Sarah McKinnon and her two daughters, Sarah and Jane. The defendants were very boisterous folks, and this kept the Court in an uproar during the proceedings. They were each fined forty cents and costs for the trespass and a further sum of forty cents for subverting the soil.

THE MISSES LePAGE are now conducting a first-class boarding house on the corner of Great George and King streets, in the building heretofore known as the "Broadway House." This house, being refitted in excellent style, situated in a most convenient part of the city, and conducted by obliging ladies, is therefore one of the most desirable for permanent boarders. In a day or two ago the imprudence of a young man was very nearly productive of serious injury to a respectable family in Quebec. Being desirous of working a small engine presented to him by a friend, he had a steam boiler in tin manufactured. To heat this boiler, he thoughtlessly placed it in the oven of a stove, and a few minutes afterwards it exploded, smashing the stove to pieces, and scattering the fragments around. Fortunately no one was struck by them.

THERE was a very good attendance at the Market to-day. Prices were as follows:—Beef, small, from 5 to 12 cts.; do quarter from 3 1/2 to 7 cts.; mutton, from 4 to 8 cts.; lamb, from 4 to 8 cts.; geese, each, from 35 to 55 cts.; ducks, from 25 to 30 cts.; chickens, per pair, from 25 to 45 cts.; butter, fresh, from 20 to 24 cts.; do tub, from 15 to 18 cts.; potatoes, from 38 to 50 cents; flour, per 100, \$3; oatmeal, \$2.75 to \$3; hay, from 45 to 50 cts.; oats, 30 cents.

At an emergency meeting of the City Council, held last evening, an opinion of His Honor the Recorder was submitted to the effect that Councillors Peake and Davy, having supplied lumber and iron-work, respectively, to the city, had forfeited their seats. Councillor Peake immediately withdrew from the Council; but Councillor Davy expressed his determination to test the soundness of the Recorder's opinion.

THE produce shipments from this port to-day are as follows:—Schooner Mary E. Mason, New York, with 4,686 bushels potatoes, by John Hughes. Schooner Edward Laymen, Newburyport, U. S., with 6,345 bushels and 50 barrels of potatoes. Schooner James, Halifax, with 1,412 bushels potatoes, by H. Monaghan. Day Spring, Halifax, with 1,100 bushels potatoes and 50 do. turnips, by Capt. Thomas.

We are glad to hear that the Rev. R. B. McDonald will lecture in the Athenaeum, under the auspices of the Reform Club, on Monday evening next, the 11th inst. The subject will be "How to read and what to read." Judging from Mr. McDonald's fame as a platform speaker, a good time may be expected. We hope to see the house filled on the occasion. The admission fee is only ten cents. This is the first of a series of lectures which is to take place before them this season.

THE Court of Chancery met in this city at eleven o'clock to-day. His Honor the Master of the Rolls presiding. This is a special sitting in order to hear an application to dissolve an injunction, granted by the Master of the Rolls on the petition of Thomas Alley, Esq., to prevent Messrs. Duchemin Bros. from using the steam engine and machinery in their workshop on Prince Street. In this matter there are thirty-two affidavits filed. Messrs. Palmer and Peters appear for the plaintiff, and Messrs. Hodgson and Morson for defendants.

**L'Empereur Est Mort.**

THE following lines on the death of the late Emperor Louis Napoleon, by the present Earl of Winchilsea, are couched in more vigorous Saxon than we usually read. The Emperor died at Camden Place, Chislehurst, Kent, in the same room wherein the then owner of the place, Thomson Bonar, Esq., and his wife, were murdered in their bed by his valet, in May, 1813. Mr. Bonar is believed to have been a natural son of the Empress Catherine of Russia:—

Of scourge and thong how sore's the need!  
Back, yelping curs of Rochefort's breed!  
Back, sons of Communistic greed?  
E'en hang the head!  
From your vile treacheries he's freed—
